five following items: general contract, C. E. Helmer, \$87,701.21; tank and tower, Pittsburg-Des Moines Bridge company, \$12,500; filtration and chlorination plant, California Jewel Filter company, \$11,520; pumps, California Jewel Filter company, \$3,598; C. E. Kelsey, plans specifications and supervision, \$4,716. To this must be added \$500, the cost of the site for the tank and tower which was purchased from J. R. Blackaby last week. The location of this is to be on 'Virtue' street and Colorado avenue, and also the purchase price of the present Ontario Water company's distributing system, \$4,000. One other item, too, will ultimately be added, that is the land necessary for the pump house and right-of-way for the pipe line from the river to the roadway.

Since the formal contract was let, owing to the change in the location of the tank and tower, the need for big cast iron pipe was reduced and that permitted changes in the specifications which will bring the entire construction cost, plus the price paid for the old system, under the \$100,000 limit.

Mr. Helmer, whose equipment is in Emmett, where he recently completed a sewer contract, said he would be able to begin work within two weeks. His contract calls for the completion of the work August 20. Mr. Shipley of the California Jewel company has portions of the filter system all ready built in San Francisco and he ordered the pumps by wire Monday night and declares that he will have his portion of the work completed before the general contract is finished.
