

## Fliers Performing Great Stunts, Says Ontario Boy

Headquarters Flying Department, they are called into active service Kelly Field No. 2, South San Antonio, Texas, April 19.—Mr. Kay Wilson and Family: Guess you think we are on the move from here or have been working so hard that we have not had time to write sooner. We have been very busy alright getting the squadron that I am in ready to leave but I am not going out with it as they would not relieve me from duty here. They are going to Georgia and from there to France soon. I don't think they will take more than half of the old men in the squadron now and the rest will be made up of recruits from the recruit camp. They are all anxious to leave here and get across the nose of them want out.

This has been more like a holiday all week than anything else, as they have been having celebrations in honor of Secretary McAdoo, who is visiting this division, and Miss Wilson, who is going from Camp to camp singing to the soldiers. Last night she was at this camp, but I did not go. I think most all of the camp was there and some of them reported that there was not enough room to get into the building. While McAdoo was there they gave celebrations in flying and all kinds of stunts in the air which seemed to please him wonderfully. One of the noted fliers, Stinson, and a dare-devil parachute jumper, was the center of attraction. Rodman Law, the brother of Ruth Law, jumped from an aeroplane 2500 feet in the air and came down in a parachute. They are testing out a new parachute so that when planes are falling the men can escape from them without injury.

This is the week that Texas celebrates every year, just the same as our fair only that there is not so much doing. They have two parades each day and then all the carnivals that follow any celebration, which is all there is to it. Every one looks forward to the fiesta but for my part I can't see much to it and have not been attending it very much, altho it is quite a change from anything I have ever seen.

Have they picked the men from there for the next draft or not? They are picking them from this state and sending them to all the camps already, and the men that are in these camps are going over or divided up and placed in the other companies to train them. The next draft will not get so much training as the last one, for they are needed over there and will be forwarded soon. They have quit giving out commissions to the men that are at the training camps but send them back to their organizations and will have to wait till

Henry and I are the only ones of the boys that are left here just now, I guess and may be here for quite a while yet. He is working the pumps on this field and has a very good job, I don't know just where Bob is, but he was supposed to go out with a detachment for France, but I don't know whether he left or not. I have written Barkley and Conley but have never received any word from them so do not know whether they have received the letters or not.

How are the crops and every thing growing there? Every thing is nice and green here now only they have been needing rain very badly until last night and it rained most all night. I think it was one of the worst rain storms that I have ever seen while I have been in this place. About 6 p. m. it was so hot that everybody was suffering and all at once it clouded up and began to rain and the wind to blow. About 12 it was the highest and we had to get up and move most all the beds in the barracks to keep them out of the rain and leak. After that we settled down and it did not bother us any more. The men in the tents were the ones that suffered for most all the tents were blown down and the men had to get up and set up tents the rest of the night, which was not pleasant.

I think I will have to be a farmer for awhile and get a furlough to go home and help put up the crops. There have been many applications placed since that order was put into effect, but I don't think that more than half of the men will be able to get furloughs. When a new order like that comes out they all want to try it and get out if there is any chance. If I pass the examination that I took quite a while ago I will be able to get a furlough for a month or more before going to school. We have not heard from it yet but are expecting a report before long on the ones that will be selected.
