San Antonio, May 1.—Mr. Ray Wilson: Received your letter yesterday and as we are not very busy this morning will answer it, for after this morning we will be so busy for three or four days that we will not have much time for anything as we have to run up all reports and start the work off right. The first of the month here is worse than any you have there for there are a thousand and one things that have to be done and all reports to be made to Washington. When I get so that I can make all these reports I will be able to handle a good size office. One thing here is that we can tell any of the Squadrons just what to do and they have to make them right out or we have the drop on them.

I wish I could be there and help you out this summer, but Uncle Sam says that he needs me just now and I guess he will keep me. As long as he gives me plenty to eat and a good place to sleep I am content to work here and do my part. Since I have been here so long it seems like this ought to be my home but just as soon as I get out I sure will move north. One continual change of weather and climate. For a week or so it was warm like July weather and now for the past three days it has rained continually so you can imagine what condition the fields and roads are in that have to be used all the time. This rain has not stopped the flying or the traffic on the roads.

I see a piece in the Argus that says that the Lyles boy is home on a furlough. He was here in this camp last fall and was shipped to Vancouver with a lumber brigade last December. They are sending a few men to work there but I think this is better than cutting trees. Several of the boys that went there are writing back that they would like to be back to Kelly Field.

The cattle men's convention must be a great thing there and the report

in the paper shows.

How is Ontario making it on the last Liberty Bond campaign? I think this camp is falling a little short, for so many have all they can carry and could not afford another one. I have taken another on of five per month. The one that I took last fall will be paid out in July, so I thought that I could carry one more at present but if they take my rank away from me I am over the boat.

I want to thank you for the money that you paid me on the contract and when I get back will be ready for a job. You may not want to hire a man from the army when they get back for this is a lazy life and they will have to start all over again. I guess I could get out of this habit after awhile but just now it sure does go hard on us if we have to get out and work a little.

There are plenty of planes and plenty of cadets here and it does not look much like there is ever a chance to learn to handle one of these things. I have never so much as had a ride in one yet, but when some of these cadets finish their course and go in as instructors I will get a chance to ride once in a while. One ride may be all that I want, but always take a chance.

Give my best regards to all, and we hope to be back in Ontario some time. Hoping to receive a letter soon. I am
