I have been looking for Jim Rae over for a long time, but I suppose that it will be quite a while before he gets here. It is summer here now but it rains quite a bit ever little while. I guess that you are starting your farming to beat the band by now. I have not seen the Landingham boy yet.

Say, that was quite a large amount of money for Ontario to raise for the Red Cross. They are certainly doing their bit as are all of you people.

I wrote to Jim Roe a few days ago and received a letter from him. He didn't get exempted I guess. It is so noisy here that I can hardly write at night and news is so scarce I guess I will have to close. Hoping to hear from you soon, I remain as ever,

BARNES CIRCUS PARADE IS PAGEANT OF PROGRESS
