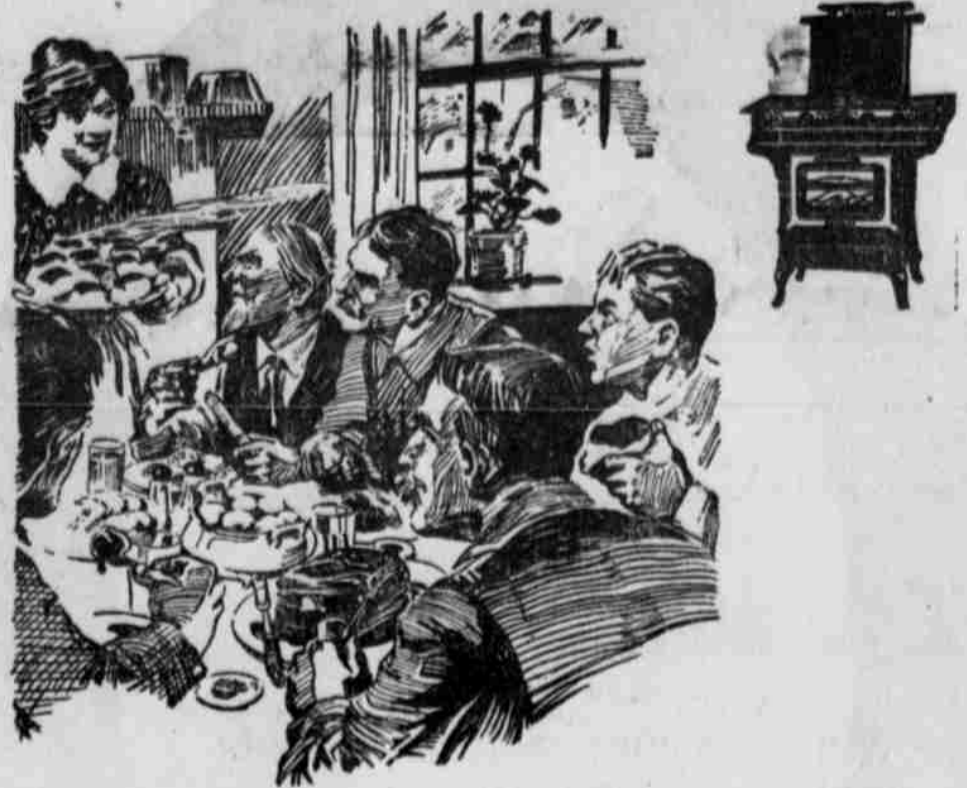
Brooke and Gallagher have been in Vale this week attending to some legal matters.
