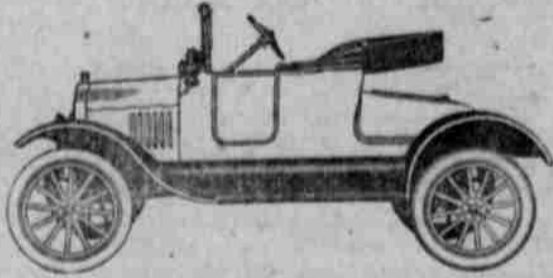

THE MAKING OF A U. S. CORPORAL

Camp Lewis, Wash., June 1, 1918. To my dear friends at home: The making of a corporal. Contrary to my expectations, a corporal is not chosen according to his merits but just according to where he happens to be in line.

After the men are lined up according to height they are counted off into squads, a squad is eight men standing four abreast, each man having his regular number 1-2-3-4 rear rank 1-2-3-4 front rank, the fourth man in the front rank becoming corporal. Of course I do not know how long he retains this title but you see a man's first promotion in the army is merely luck.

This morning as soon as we were up we were instructed to prepare for inspection. We had to make our beds absolutely without a wrinkle; our toilet kits had to be lying on the foot of our beds, each article in its proper place and perfectly clean. If there was the least dirt on or about the bunk a man is given K. P. for a week. This means washing dishes, peeling spuds and waiting on table.

Immediately after breakfast we were called to assemble in front of barracks in this inspection; we all stand at attention as the officers pass along. If there is a soiled spot on your clothes, a button gone, teeth unclean, if you are unshaven or your hair is not cut according to regulations, one week K. P.

The mess hall is a large building containing five long tables. I guess it is about as large as the Ford garage in Ontario. The kitchen is called off of one end. We are called to mess and must fall in line just any place we happen to be so are never in the same place at table twice. We march to the table and stand at attention till the officer in charge gives the order "seats."

After we have eaten we each take our knife, fork, spoon, tin plate and coffee cup, fall in line and pass to a long table across the back of the room. As we pass the garbage can we clean our plates, then drop our knife, fork, and spoon in a can and set our other dishes on the table, march out of the hall and are at our leisure.

900,000 AMERICAN TROOPS IN FRANCE

United States Is Five Months Ahead of Program For Sending Army Overseas.

Washington.—Nine hundred thousand men have been shipped across the sea, General March told newspaper correspondents at the weekly conference Saturday.

The United States is five months ahead of its program for placing an army in France, General March said.

The figures on American troop movements are significant, since General March at his first conference fixed the number at more than 800,000, the addition of 100,000 during the past week showing the rate of progress that is being made.

General March accorded high praise to the Americans sharing in the present struggle. They have done well and have delivered the goods, he said.

Especially did he commend the first regular division under General Robert L. Bullard for its gallantry at Cantigny, the Rainbow national guard division under General C. T. Menoher for high grade work to date; the Twenty-sixth division is doing very well.

One of the most striking things on the western front, the chief of staff declared, was the supreme importance of a unified command. This was first advocated, he added, by President Wilson and carried through under the president's constant pressure, until unity of command was realized in the appointment of General Foch. General March regarded that as one of the greatest single military achievements of the allies which are already showing its effect in the fighting.

BIG GUN OUTLAY TO BREAK RECORD

Washington.—Legislation is pending which will authorize the expenditure by the United States of the largest single outlay for big guns in the history of the world.

The gigantic plans of the United States were disclosed through the approval by the house appropriations committee of a huge fortification program. The bill passed on by the committee carries a total of \$8,410,000,273, the principal expenditures being for heavy artillery.

Based on an American army of 3,000,000 men, the plans which the measure supports have been approved by the Inter-Allied War Council, through General Pershing. It was said by Representative Borland, of Missouri.

The report of the committee shows that the new government plant for production of heavy artillery at Neville Island, in the Ohio river near Pittsburg, is to equal the famous Krupp plant in Germany.

For the Neville Island plant \$40,000,000 is appropriated. Manufacture of heavy pieces will be carried on also at plants of the Bethlehem and Midvale Steel companies, the report discloses.

AMERICAN LOSSES INCREASE

General Pershing's Report Shows 8634 Killed, Wounded and Missing.

Washington.—Casualties in the American army overseas thus far reported by General Pershing, including the list made public Sunday, total 8634, as compared with 8085 a week ago. They were divided in the war department's weekly summary as follows:

Killed in action (including 291 lost at sea), 1312.
Died of wounds, 432.
Died of disease, 1268.
Died of accidents and other causes, 445.
Wounded in action, 4811.
Missing in action, including prisoners, 365.

Casualties among the marines are not included in this list.

With some 900,000 men now in France, the small number of deaths for disease reported is considered remarkable.

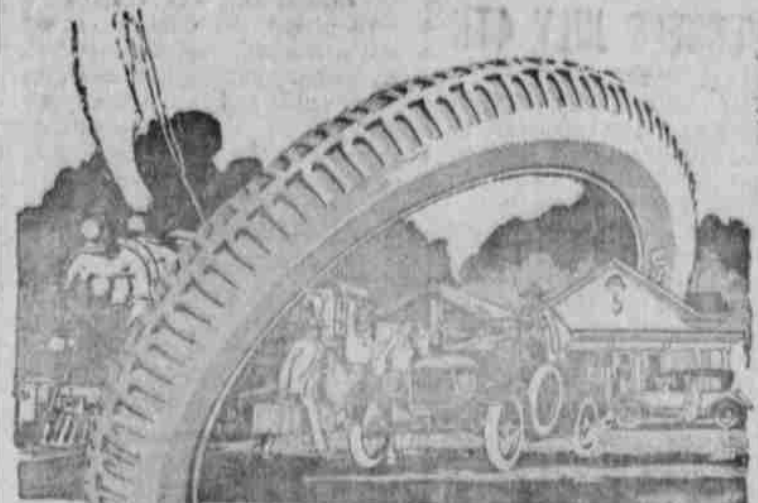

New Turkish Loan Falls

Washington.—Failure of the latest Turkish loan was reported in a dispatch from Switzerland announcing that only 12,000,000 pounds was obtained of 32,000,000 pounds sought.

Express Rates Will Rise

Washington.—Ten per cent increase in express rates was approved by the interstate commerce commission.
