GERMAN LINE IS OVER OURCO RIVER

Fere-en-Tardenois, Big German Supply Base, Is Taken By Allies.

With the American Army on the Aisne-Marne front.—The German line is again north of the Ourcq river and Fere-en-Tardenois, the German supply base, has been entered by French troops. The tightening of the flanks holds promise that the retreat will continue.

The line along the greater part of the bottom of the Soissons-Rheims salient has been pushed forward in some places as much as five miles.

The edge of the German salient to the south and southeast of Fere-en-Tardenois was ground down by the whirl of the allied troops and dulled to an extent that German weakness was indicated at many points. The first indication of this was seen Saturday, when the enemy retreated so rapidly that the Franco-American troops entirely lost contact with him.

In the battle of the woods, the stiffest resistance the Americans ever experienced in this kind of warfare was encountered. Franco-American troops were compelled to contend constantly with a rear guard action, consisting principally of machine gunners, most of whom, dressed in green clothing, hid nests in trees.

Day after day during the fighting the allied troops bucked the German machine gun nests, using artillery and machine guns and some gas against them.

In the rear guard fighting, which was carried on to permit of the withdrawal of the heavier German guns, the enemy resorted to numerous tricks, such as carrying machine guns in stretchers when endeavoring to reach some points under the allied fire. When they realized that their stretcher trick had been discovered, the Germans resorted to other means to deceive.

The wounds received by the American soldiers have not been serious as a rule, on account of the failure of the Germans to use artillery. A great majority of the wounds were clean flesh wounds, made by bullets from machine guns and rifles.

ALLIES STRIKE ON NEW FRONT

Drive in Picardy Grows From Front of 20 Miles to More Than 40 Miles.

Paris.—Marshal Foch has struck the Germans on a new front and French opinion, lay and professional, is lost in admiration of the manner in which the blow has been carried out.

The present maneuver on the Picardy front is similar to the counter offensive north of the Marne in that it is directed toward squeezing two sides of a salient.

The allied drive, begun over a meager front of less than 20 miles, has grown to a width of more than 40 miles, extending in an irregular line from Albert to Vignemont. Reports received stated that the fighting is spreading northward toward Arras and eastward toward the Oise. When it will have reached these points the battle will present a front of nearly 75 miles.

Nearly 40,000 prisoners and 700 guns have been taken by the allies in Picardy, according to reliable information here.

Extremely bitter resistance is being encountered from the Germans along the line of Chaumes-Roye-Noyon. The enemy is bringing up strong reinforcements, while the allies are preparing for a further advance.

The French advanced eastward after their capture of Montdidier.

The Germans at Montdidier were caught between the jaws of a vice. Converging attacks from the north and from the south succeeded in encircling the town.

The French advance rendered useless to the Germans the Montdidier-Chaumes railway which was the only line feeding the front at the bottom of the Montdidier pocket.

The supplies taken have been so large that it has not been possible to make an inventory of them as yet. It includes an enormous number of shells of all calibers and arms of all description.

GERMANS RELYING ON MACHINE GUNS

Paris.—Anglo-French troops have gained the ascendancy. The line in Picardy is held solidly by infantry. Cavalry skirmishers are well in advance of it, and preparing the way for further progress.

The Germans are relying on machine guns to stem the allied tide, not wishing to risk capture of their artillery. The enemy is defending himself with desperate courage wherever the position affords means, and the officers are shooting down any soldiers who show symptoms of quitting.

French and British light troops, patrols and armored cars are reported operating far beyond the points mentioned in the official statements. The infantry is following untrammelled and in sufficient masses to crush all attempts made by the enemy to counter attack.

The majority of the prisoners so far taken are rather old, which the newspapers say shows that the secondary divisions were holding the line. The number of officers is very large, while fully one-half of the guns behind the German lines have been captured.

AMIENS OUT OF GUN RANGE

Great Transportation Center Safe, Thanks to Allied Triumphs.

London.—Speaking at a luncheon at Newport, Monmouthshire, Premier Lloyd George emphasized the importance of the pushing back of the Germans from within gun range of the Amiens railway.

"Hundreds of trains used to pass through Amiens daily," the Premier said, "but we were temporarily deprived of its use until recently, when we were able to employ 20 trains daily. Amiens is now safe, through the recent allied triumphs on the Marne and the Somme, which were due to the unity of command."

German Embassy to Quit Moscow.

Copenhagen.—The German embassy at Moscow will remove immediately to Pskov, owing to conditions in Moscow, according to advices from Berlin. Pskov is 162 miles southwest of Petrograd.

Prisoners Now 26,000.

Paris.—The number of prisoners taken so far in the allied offensive in Picardy is now estimated at 26,000, including more than 1800 officers. More than 300 guns have been captured, according to the latest advices.

Karlsruhe Hit by Bombs.

London.—An official communication issued by the air ministry says that air raids have been made on Karlsruhe and that there was an explosion in the Karlsruhe station.

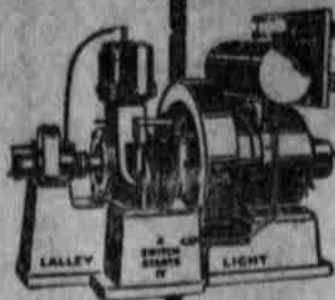

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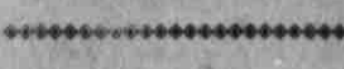
