HOUSE ADOPIS MANPOWER BILL

Changes of Only Minor Nature Made in War Department Measure.

Washington.—The new manpower bill, extending the selective draft to all men between the ages of 18 and 45 years, was passed by the house with only minor changes in the draft of the war department.

On the first roll call only two negative votes were cast—by Representative London, of New York, the socialist, and Representative Gordon, of Ohio, democrat. The final vote was announced as 336 to 2.

The final vote was preceded by three days' debate, during which the chief contention was an amendment to defer the calling of youths from 18 to 20 years until older men had been summoned.

An attempt in the house to insert a work or fight amendment by which those exempted from military service on occupational grounds would be required to remain at their civil tasks, failed, 52 to 91.

The amendment was directed against strikes and was characterized by officials of the American Federation of Labor as conscription of labor.

The house reversed its action in voting to include members of congress in the draft. By a rising vote, 89 to 143, it defeated an amendment by Representative Greig, of Texas, which would make members of congress, state legislatures and federal and state executive officers liable to draft.

SOLDIERS STAND WAR TEST WELL

Washington.—Announcing that more than 1,500,000 American soldiers have embarked for foreign shores, General March reiterated his belief the presence of 4,000,000 troops of the United States in France by next summer would enable the allies to carry out any campaign they may adopt for the defeat of Germany and the end of the war.

General March impressed the newspaper men who met him in the conference with the absolute confidence American officers have in their men as a result of the initial tests on the battlefields of France.

"My confidence in the soldiers is inspired and developed by serving with them and beside them in battle. I have ordered back from France certain men who have won distinction over there to give them increased rank in the divisions organizing at home.

"These officers are now telling me interesting things which have not yet come over in official reports. One officer reported specifically that in one engagement of the first American division the men captured 58 German guns and brought them in at the rear of our trucks. On the same occasion they took 2500 prisoners.

"Another officer reported that the second division, which he was with, captured 10 complete German batteries, which they brought in and presented to General Pershing."

GERMANS TIRED OF WAR

Prisoners Taken by Americans Say New Teuton Offensive Unlikely. With the American Army on the Vosse.—German soldiers believe that Germany is not planning any more offensives because of the manpower shortage, according to one of a party of seven of a German patrol captured by the Americans east of Fliemes. The prisoner said the German soldiers no longer had any enthusiasm for war.

Most of those with whom he came in contact believed the war would end soon. The prisoner had been fighting for three years, and declared he was thoroughly tired of it. He said the soldiers understood that the German losses during the recent allied offensives had been very great.

Plenty of Germans, he added, would desert and surrender if given the opportunity. Many of them are constantly watching for a chance to give themselves up.

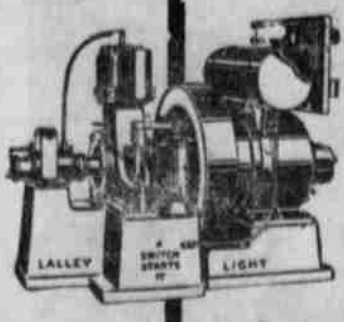
Draft Treaty With Italy Signed.
