SINS OF SLACKERS WILL FIND THEM OUT

Patriotic Duty to Buy Liberty Bonds Declares Preacher in Patriotic Sermon—Draws Biblical Comparison.

The six of the individual slacker and pacifist who fails to buy Liberty Bonds, to support the Red Cross, the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A. and in every way to the limit of his ability aid the government, will be found out. Should any citizen of Ontario or community, backing in the sunshine of one of the most fertile valleys in all the world dare hide behind the British navy or crouch at the cry of blood for vengeance which has baptized the valley of the Marne and the plains of Flanders? Was the question which Rev. W. F. Cochran propounded to the congregation of the United Presbyterian church during the course of Liberty Loan sermon last Sunday morning.

"If Germany is not forced at the point of the bayonet to disgorge Belgium, Northern France, Serbia, Poland and the Rumanian provinces she will ultimately make conquest of America and confiscate in like manner," continued the preacher. "The flag must be hoisted to his altar in Berlin. The star is a crucial test between democracy and democracy, between sanity and madness, between civilization and barbarism, between freedom and bondage, between progression and retrogression, between truth and falsehood, between government of the people, by the people, for the people, and between government by the few and for the few.

"If Germany should win as a nation, we would ultimately lose everything that is worth while—the legacy of our forefathers, our free institutions, our inalienable rights to individual initiative in life's affairs, our respect for the Bible of Germany's great teacher Van Lehnitz has taught for two hundred years that 'reason is superior to revelation' thus repudiating Luther and his Bible and the book which the German queen of England, Queen Victoria, laid her hand on and said:

"This is the secret of Britain's greatness." Yes, the slacker's sin will find him out when the gallant young men from our home firesides return victorious, and the accounts of every citizen are open for inspection as to who supported to his utmost every soldier with adequate equipment for effective battle. The questions will probably be asked by every man in khaki. "How much did you do to send us food and clothing and ammunition?" It will be found out to his shame for generations to come.

It is well said that history repeats itself. When Moses, the greatest lawyer and legislator of the ages and author of the Decalogue was commissioned to lead two millions of bondsmen and their families out of Egyptian bondage under which they had been held for nearly four thousand years, and when he had reached the Jordan river beyond which was the "land of promise," "the land flowing with milk and honey," two

tribes, the Raabentites and the Gadites denounced as to crossing the river and giving battle to take possession; they proposed to take the inviting pastureland east of the Jordan as their portion. They just put up a slacker's and a pacifist's proposition. The promised land was occupied by the Canaanites whose name had become a branding and a by word among the nations, who had sunk to the lowest depths of sin and were not deserving of the possession of any land or national existence. Moses was equal to the emergency and said to the two tribes: "shall your brethren go to war and shall ye sit here?" "If ye do not go across with your brethren be sure your sin will find you out," as it did your fathers forty years ago when ye were commanded to "go up and possess the land." The slacker and pacifist saw "men of great stature" and "cities fortified and very great" and said to Caleb who commanded to "go up and possess the land, no—"We are not able to go up against the people for they are stronger than we," for we were in our own sight as grass hoppers, and so we are in their sight." Because of this their sin found them out in forty years wanderings and hardships and the death of every male citizen of military age on leaving Egyptian bondage.

Shall our brethren the democratic nations of England and France go to war and shall we sit here—we stand or fall together. Caleb said to Israel "we are well able to overcome" but his following said no. President Wilson has said we are well able to overcome and the people have said, yes.

WEALTH OF AMERICA SCARCELY SCRATCHED

Fourth Liberty Loan is Challenge to Spirit of American People—Our Harder Light Compared to Other Nations.

Once again our government is asking for our money. The Fourth Liberty Loan to be opened for subscription on September 25 is our opportunity to lead. With the faith that characterizes her progress, our nation has called for a sum larger than any of the previous loans called for—a sum larger than most of us can comprehend. Six million dollars, for the immediate use of our army and navy departments is the minimum with which the Government can be satisfied at the present time.

As yet, we have not begun to feel the burden of providing the government with funds. Neither as a nation nor as individuals do we come in the class with the other belligerents in the matter of financial obligations. Compare the ratio of the national debt to the total wealth of the nations at war:

Germany 27 per cent.
France 27 per cent.
Great Britain 45 per cent.
United States 5 per cent.

We have not tapped the surface of our national wealth in our quest for war financing. Nor do we as individuals carry a heavy per capita burden. Against

Germany's \$450; France's \$550; Great Britain's \$600; Italy's \$190; Austria's \$250; place the United States' \$115.

One hundred and fifteen dollars is not much to owe for our country, is it? What one of us here who would hesitate to assume that obligation for a friend, not to mention one to whom we owe all that means most to life to us.

We might give the country that hundred and fifteen dollars which it figures is the debt of each of us; give that sum before we begin to invest for ourselves. But the Government does not ask that,—does not expect that. It asks to borrow what we can save and earn in this hour of special need.

Marshall Foch says: "The will to win is half the battle." American soldiers have shown their will to win. The Fourth Liberty Loan is before the American people. It must prove OUR will to win.

PETITIONERS WANT LEVY FOR HIGHWAY

Federal and State Aid Available if County Meets Requirements—Special Levy Only Method Available.

Malheur county can participate in the distribution of State and Federal highway funds if it will provide \$20,000 as its share of a total of \$100,000. That is all the county has to do to receive \$40,000 from the State funds and \$40,000 from federal funds.

To accomplish this and secure the construction of either a section of the John Day Highway or the Burns to Vale Highway a movement has been started at Vale to have the proposition placed on the ballot this fall. This is the only way in which the county can meet the requirements Judge George McKnight explained when inquiries were addressed to him asking why this procedure was necessary.

He said: "when the court is in favor of meeting the requirements asked of the county necessary to creating a \$100,000 fund for the purpose above named, yet they are prohibited by the constitutional limitation. meeting the requirements asked of the County necessary of creating a \$100,000 fund for the purpose above named, yet they are prohibited by the constitutional limitation.

"The Court raised by taxation for road purposes in round numbers \$50,000 for the current year, \$25,000 of this fund decended to the various road districts leaving \$15,000 in the Gen. Road fund for the Court to spend. From this fund only could an appropriation be made. From this fund, all road machinery bought and kept in repair; Road Master paid, expenses of creating all new roads, and altering or abandoning old ones. If any weak interior Road Districts gets any special help it must come this Gen. Road fund; for the Statute demands 75 per cent of the tax any District pays in, back to them, and the Court can take it away and give it to another.

"Under the limitation the Court can not raise a greater amount than the amount raised last year, plus 6

per cent which would be about \$52,000 for all road purposes making about \$16,000 in the General Road Fund, for coming year.

"The call for help from the weak interior Districts will not be less, the upkeep of bridges and machinery are growing greater and greater, while probable emergencies must always be calculated on.

"It is plainly seen, that the \$20000 is secured from the State and federal Government, the people must vote the tax to raise the \$20,000 required by the State Highway Commission."
