"Matter of prices asked by Young Men's Christian Association for its articles sold in canteens overseas already investigated by war department and condition is being remedled. The Young Men's Christian Association. originally asked by General Pershing to run the canteens for the army on a cost basis. In order to do this it had to recken in price fixing such overhead charges as transportation charges and marine insurance so that prices were much higher than in this country.

"The Young Men's Christian Association made no profits, but lost thoucands of dollars. Arrangements now made will enable them to obtain supplies from sources that will reduce overhead charges and keep prices
