GERMAN RETREAT MAY BE EXTENSIVE

With the Allied Armies in France and Belgium.—Reliable information received from the other side of the line indicates that the German retreat will carry the enemy back many miles, if not all the way to Germany itself. Many prisoners captured on different parts of the line declare Belgium and France are in process of evacuation.

Detailed reports are coming in respecting several lines of German defenses, but none of these lines seem to be more than temporary.

Forty bridges have been thrown across the Meuse in the neighborhood of Huy, southwest of Liege, and the source from which this information is derived says that they are in preparation for the retreat of the Germans behind their own frontier.

The country from which the Germans are withdrawing offers striking proof of German brutality and destructiveness. Preliminary reconnaissances in vast stretches of recaptured territory

show that in addition to the destruction of military establishments the Germans before departing demolished every factory and all mines. In many houses the Germans placed "booby" traps and infernal machines, which apparently were designed as much for civilians as for soldiers.

GRIEF NEWS OF THE WAR

Victory crowns the allied arms on every battle front. Northern Belgium is being rapidly cleared of the enemy by British and Belgian forces. Belgians have occupied Zebrugge and crossed the Ghent-Bruges canal, and on their left have reached the Dutch frontier.

Thousands of civilians have been liberated by the Belgians and French and masses of booty fell into their hands.

It is considered quite possible that the Germans will try to make several successive stands in Belgium, and one line of resistance undoubtedly will comprise Antwerp, Brussels and Namur, on which much work is being done.

In France, east of Lille to Cambrai, the British are pressing forward, despite supreme efforts of the enemy, plotting out the big salient with the Tournai as its northern and Valenciennes its southern enemy-held bases. To reduce this salient Field Marshal Haig, with whose forces Americans are brigaded, is driving hard along the Bohain-Le Cateau front in a maneuver which is throwing Valenciennes into a dangerous pocket.

In Champagne the Germans are strongly resisting the French and Americans in their attempts to drive northward toward Mezieres and Sedan.

The American front has been the scene of constant patrol fighting with General Pershing's men moving ahead slightly in Loos and Bantheville wood.

LIBERATED FRENCH PEOPLE CELEBRATE

With the British Army in France—Roubaix and Turoing joyously celebrated their deliverance from the enemy.

The people of the two cities were wild with emotional joy. There were kisses, hugs and handshakes for every British soldier. There was good reason for Roubaix and Turoing to celebrate. The swashbuckling Germans had gone, though they left in their wake as much ruin as they could do. Nearly every home in the city had been sacked and things that could not be carried away were destroyed.

Placed as being forced to leave the towns, the Germans went to extreme lengths to loot, destroy and steal Roubaix and Turoing were systematically looted. In Roubaix, the Germans carried off fine leather seats from chairs, ripped pictures from their frames and even took the cloth covers of mattresses.

Doubt in its waste and desolation is not slight.

The streets are filled with furniture and articles of all kinds. It might be said that in Douai all the insane asylums had been opened and that mad men in their fury had taken delight in destroying everything. The material losses are incalculable.

SPURN AUSTRIAN PROMISES

Break With Hapsburg Dynasty—Proposed by Czech-Slovaks. London.—The emperor of Austria-Hungary, in a manifesto to the "Austrian peoples," announced that organization of Austria on a federalized basis would be carried out.

Simultaneously there has been made public a resolution, adopted by the Czech-Slovak National Council and the Union of Czech deputies at Prague completely repudiating the Austrian government and any promises it may make.

Vindictive advices say that Emperor Charles' plan does not include the union of Austrian Poland with the "independent Polish state." The city of Trieste and the Trieste region will be treated separately "in conformity with the wishes of the population."

Retreating Teuts Trapped in Holland. London.—Fifteen thousand retreating German soldiers have been "interred" in Holland after being cut off by Belgian troops moving northward from Eindhoven, according to reports from the frontier reaching Amsterdam.
