BUY W.S.S.— NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION OF PAYETTE-OREGON SLOPE IRRIGATION DISTRICT.

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to order of the Board of Directors of the Payette-Oregon Slope Irrigation District, duly entered on November 25, 1918, an election will be held within the said District on December 30, 1918, for the purpose of determining whether six per cent bonds of the District, in the amount of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars shall be issued for the purpose of meeting the deficit in maintenance for the year 1918, meeting the cost of enlarging the ditches and dredging the intake canal, and to provide funds for the purchase of a new pumping unit to supplement the existing pumping machinery of the District.

For the purpose of the election, the District shall comprise a single election precinct, the polling place in which shall be at the office of the Board of Directors to-wit: the one-story frame dwelling house near the pumping plant, located in the Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section 2, Township 17 South, Range 17 E. W. M., within the District and in Malheur County, Oregon.

The polls shall be open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, and shall thereafter be closed.

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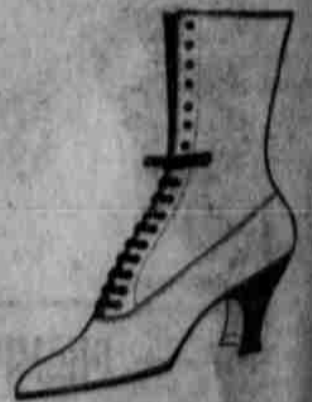
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
