

NOTICE OF ASSESSMENT FOR LATERAL SEWER DISTRICT NO. 8.

Pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 316, passed and approved the 20th day of November, A. D. 1918, notice is hereby given that the assessments for Lateral Sewer District No. 8, of said city, have been levied and entered in the City Lien Docket. The date of such entry is November 20, 1918. All of said assessments are due and payable within ten (10) days after service of this notice, and if not paid within such time there will be added a penalty of five (5) per cent and such assessments will draw interest at the rate of ten (10) per cent per annum; provided, however, that at any time within said ten day period owner of any piece of property assessed in the sum of Twenty Five Dollars, (\$25) or more, may file in the office of the undersigned city recorder, an application to pay such assessments in ten (10) equal annual installments with interest on the unpaid assessments or installments thereof at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, payable annually. Forms of such applications may be obtained from the undersigned city recorder, and all applications must be made on such forms or in others substantially like them. Description of the property assessed with the name of the owner and the sum assessed against each piece of property, is as follows.
