WAR WORK DRIVE IS RECORD ACHIEVEMENT (Continued From Page 1)

District number 53 is one of the smaller districts on Dead Ox Flat, opposite Payette. The work was well taken care of by Mr. C. C. Darnell, Ira Book and John Underwood. Several residents of this district subscribed at Ontario, and thereby cut down the total for which this district should be credited.

District number 61 is the Kingman Colony country. Mr. C. E. Peck was chairman, and had a splendid committee to assist him in the drive. The results produced in that district were most excellent. Mr. Fred Powell and Mr. J. S. Glascock were solicited to contribute, but refused to do so, each saying that they were not able.

Mr. O. V. Holloway canvassed district number 64 in a very able manner. Two residents of this district subscribed in Ontario and thereby reduced the total for which the district should be credited. Mr. J. A. Winlow was solicited to subscribe in the drive, but refused to do so, saying that he did not give money to buy cigarettes and tobacco for the soldiers.

District number 73 was practically deserted, so no canvass was made there. Mr. O. E. Travis, who formerly resided in the district, contributed \$7.50, directly to the central committee.

The committee encountered many pleasant as well as unpleasant features in the drive. Mr. C. H. Helmer, the contractor, was at Twin Falls, Idaho, while the drive was going on. The local committee telegraphed him, soliciting a subscription of \$50.00, to which he replied: "Sure, you never have to even ask in such cases, from me." Another pleasant feature of the campaign was the large donation of the Standard Oil Company, whose \$400.00 check was much appreciated.

Strong efforts were made to obtain subscriptions from all foreign corporations that are making good money in Ontario but spending it elsewhere. The most persistent effort was made to procure a subscription from the Idaho Power Company, but none could be obtained. The last letter, written to the President of the Company, at the Boise office was not even favored with a reply.

All unpaid pledge cards have been turned over to Mr. R. M. Perry, of the First National Bank, in Ontario, Oregon, who will act as collector in the future. This refers, however, to the pledge cards in the Ontario District only, and not those which were pledged at Vale.

In conclusion, I desire to thank all persons who have assisted me in this drive, and to thank the public for the manner in which they met our solicitors, and their generous response. Respectfully submitted, W. W. WOOD, County Chairman.
