## COLLEGE TEAM FALLS BEFORE LOCAL FIVE

Superior Speed in First Half Wins Game for Ontario All-Stars Over College of Idaho—Score 24 to 15

In an interesting combination of basket ball, foot ball and wrestling the Ontario All-Stars, make up of present and former high school stars of basket ball, won from the College of Idaho five by a score of 24 to 15, last Saturday evening.

The game was played before a good sized crowd at the old Opera House and was from the spectator's stand point all that could be desired. The game was fast and interesting and since Ontario led all the way there were no cases of palpitation of the excitable hearts of the feminine rooters, who furnished most of the crowd.

The game was won for Ontario in the first half. During that session, that combination which in days gone by has won many victories for Ontario: Fred Test, Joy Husted and Claude Christiansen was at its best.

As the game went on the boys showed that they were not in tip top condition, for they had practiced but three or four times together prior to the game and several of them had not played in years. As the result in the second half each team made the same score, nine points.

It would be hard to pick the star players on the local team for each played well. There was a tendency on the part of all the players to disregard team work for individual shooting. That was true of the Idaho boys as well.

In the second half the Ontario line up was changed and Stub Gramse and Fred Gramse took the places of Christiansen and Howser.

Howser and Madden, at present on the High School team, the smaller than their opponents handled their men in good shape. Madden followed Test the high point winner, while Husted and Howser at guards each played well. Christiansen was all over the floor with the opposing center.

The principal advantage that the local boys had over the visitors was that shown by Test and Madden to locate the basket, and the guarding of the opponents.

L. L. Culbertson, formerly of this city, refereed the game well. That it was a rough one was due to the limited capacity of the floor, rather than the disposition of the players.

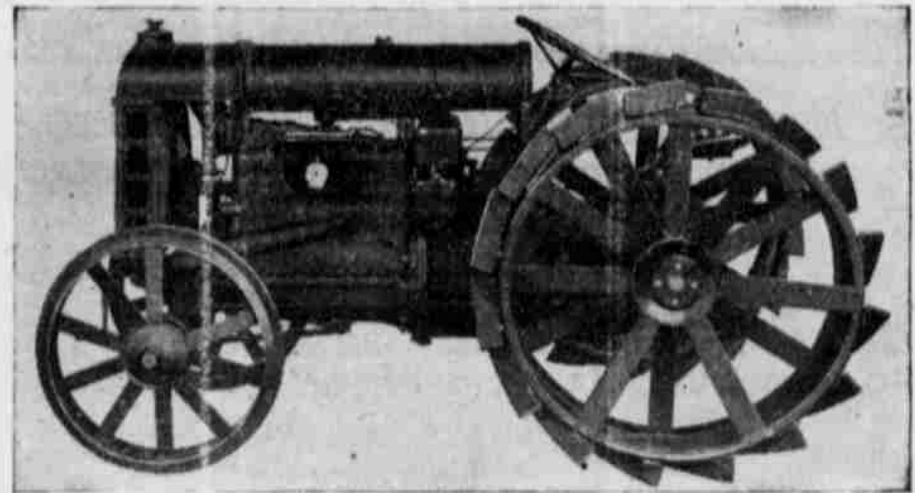
