BETTER DAIRY STOCK SUBJECT OF MEETING (Continued From Page 1) of the dairy business. The large crops of alfalfa and corn silage that are produced here can be marketed to better advantage thru good dairy cattle than in any other way offered to the producers. The quality of the herds of the future is dependent upon the good judgment used in breeding practices now. Improvement in bulking qualities of cows or heifers can only come thru using bulls from a high milk producing line of ancestry. The use of such bulls often result in an increased butter fat production of 100 pounds or more a year in the daughters of such bulls over the amount given by their dams. The cost of such bulls is prohibitive to the man with a few cows when working alone. The bull association, however, provides means whereby a man with only a few cows can secure the use of such a bull at a price no higher than the cost or service of an inferior bull. The development of the irrigation

projects in Malheur county is, I believe, dependent upon the dairy cows. Hay is sure to be lower in price. There is a world shortage of dairy products, hence the dairy cow will provide the best market for hay. The quality of the cows will determine the price received for hay. I expect to be in Malheur county on Friday and Saturday February 11 and 12 and if there are groups of farmers in any place in the vicinity of Ontario or Nyssa or in the Drain Flat country who would be interested in learning more about the plans of securing and handling these high class bulls which is proving so successful in other places, I will be very glad to meet with them. If you can give this some publicity and assist in arranging a meeting or meetings for purpose I believe you will be rendering your dairy farmers a real service. I expect that E. L. Westover (who was also in attendance at the December meeting) will be with me. Expect to arrive at Moore Hotel Thursday evening or Friday morning.
