"HEY THERE!" DO YOU WANT A HOME ON A FARM?

This is the unique title of a little booklet which the Secretary of the Interior, with the active cooperation of the War and Navy Department, is sending to the various camps of the army, navy, and marine corps throughout the country to ascertain that attitude of the men toward his plan for providing them with work and homes on reclaimed land.

The booklet is in the form of questions and answers which give a complete and concise description of the plan, and also has attached to it a post card questionnaire which the men are asked to fill out and mail

to the Department. Each man interested will be asked to state his name, home address, age, occupation before enlistment, whether he has ever worked on a farm, whether he is interested in the plan, what kind of farming he would like to follow, whether general, livestock, truck, or fruit, and whether he would be willing to take a job in his own State or anywhere in the United States if the job on one of these proposed projects is offered to him.

A tabulation of the replies will be presented to Congress in connection with Secretary Lane's request for an initial appropriation of \$100,000,000 to begin construction on meritorious projects throughout the United States.
