It possible to get people into the country. He called attention to the need for road building to employ labor at this time when so many men are being discharged from the army. The settlement of the land, too, with the increased value will, he declared, return to the county all the money spent in taxes within a few years. Mr. Gallagher also emphasized the fact that in this matter the county has the opportunity of securing State, Federal, and Desert Land Board aid, and thus for a comparatively small expenditure can secure a great increase in the road mileage of the county.

Mr. Blackburn pointed out the fact that for three weeks no mail reached Jordan Valley because of the impossibility of the roads, that the people there have paid taxes for years and received but little return in road money, that the trade now all goes to Idaho towns because of the inability of the people to reach points in Oregon. He pointed out the further fact that from Jordan Valley to Vale and Ontario is but 196 miles by the proposed Succor Creek site recommended by the State engineers while it is 127 miles by the Watson route, and the latter according to the report is far more expensive.

Mr. Boyer gave figures to show the excessive cost of hauling freight into Jordan Valley now, it being \$35 per ton in summer, and entirely prohibitive in winter; while with a good route the cost will be reduced to from \$15 to \$20 per ton.

### Ranchers Tell of Needs

G. K. Aiken of the Argus first presented the request of the ranchers to the Southwest of the City for an immediate improvement of the Boulevard and other roads in that section, stating that for three weeks over portions of the road the rural carriers, the milk collection trucks and other vehicles necessary to the life of the people had been absent, on behalf of the business men of Ontario who joined with the ranchers in asking for relief he requested court to relieve the condition.

J. H. Forbes, confirmed the previous statement as the condition of the roads and added further evidence, telling how impossible it is for the ranchers to haul hay to feed cattle or the cars for shipment, and this he added must be done now.

C. T. Lackey, W. H. Pennington, G. W. Dean, C. L. Thompson and other of the ranchers spoke on the subject.

### \$10,000 for Brogan Road

After listening to the pleas of the delegation Judge Test told the gathering that the Court had but \$57,000 in the road funds, from which 3,000 miles of road had to be cared for. He said that already an appropriation of \$10,000 had been made to meet the State and Federal aid for the Brogan-Cow Valley road across the John Day valley. The road from Ontario to Vale still has four miles to be graveled, and the balance must be repaired, but he said that the Boulevard with a big population to serve would receive the consideration of the Court, and likewise the Succor Creek road would be considered. He thanked the delegation for coming before the Court and urged them to

cus on the appointments and returned to the council chamber a few minutes later and approved them.

### Propose Charter Amendment

After ordering the dragging of the streets while the ground is soft, the Council spent some time trying to devise plans for the improvement of the city. The hard fact that there is not sufficient cash on hand or in prospect for ambitious plans was the stumbling block to ever propose.

Recorder Stearns called to the Council's attention the fact that the City has thousands of dollars tied up in local improvement taxes which the city has been forced to pay when property owners, particularly non-residents, have failed to do so. He declared that of the money could be secured that the city's financial situation would be relieved.

To get this money he proposed that the City Charter be amended at the special election which is to be held in June, so that the city can sell the property and give a good valid deed.

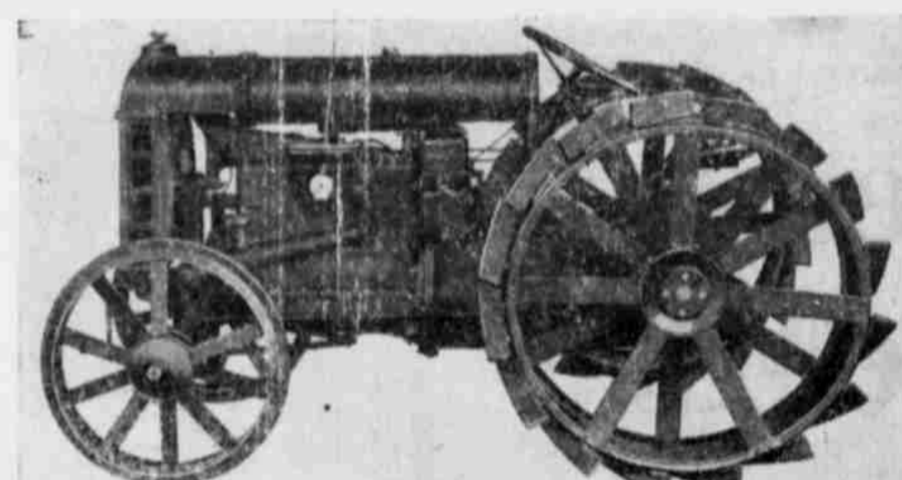
### Refuse to Allow Claims

A large portion of the long meeting was devoted to discussion of the claims presented by W. E. Lees for damages alleged to have been done plumbing in the various buildings he owns on Oregon street, by the sand which reached the mains from the filters during the first month of operation. Capt. Kenneth E. Shipley of the California Jewel Filter company who built the system was at the meeting and declared that he had attempted to settle the matter with Mr. Lees and was willing to allow \$50 for the damages, but would not pay the \$148, the lowest figure Mr. Lees would accept.

Since Mr. Lees was declared to have said he would sue the city for the full amount, City Attorney P. J. Gal-

agher suggested that the Filter company put up an indemnity bond to protect the city and take the city's warrant for the balance due it. This was done. The claims of the First National Bank for \$5 for damages done was allowed. The Council also refused to pay the disputed bill of J. A. Draper for lumber used in the building of the pump at the water-plant.

The request of the fire department for additional equipment was refused to a special committee consisting of Councilmen Laxon, Troxell and Allen. Two new hydrants were ordered, installed and one charged prior to adjournment.
