PAUL McCULLOCH IS VICTIM OF ACCIDENT

High School Student Struck by Careening Fire Engine Suffers Serious Fracture of Hip—Fire Does no Damage.

Struck by the careening chemical fire engine which was being pulled by the Idaho Power company's truck, Paul McCulloch, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McCulloch, was severely injured Wednesday morning. He suffered a fractured hip bone and a number of minor bruises.

The accident occurred when the fire department was called to extinguish a grass fire near the home of W. J. Spencer west of the High School building. When the fire engine passed the school house McCulloch with a number of other High School boys ran toward the fire and as the cart passed them endeavored to get onto the running board. As the cart swayed from side to side one of the wheels hit the young man and threw him violently to the ground where he was picked up and rushed to the offices of Dr. Prinzing, Weese and Fortner where medical attention was given and an X-ray photo was taken showing the fracture.

Today the young man was resting as easily as could be expected and the attending physicians expect no permanent injuries will result.

MALHEUR COUNTY IS MISSING OPPORTUNITY

Increase of Dairy Herds Seen as Desirable Effort by Visitors—Means Added Wealth — Keeps Money at Home.

A. G. Clark who is in the city as Oregon State Chamber of Commerce manager of the Associated Industries of Oregon—an organization of the manufacturers and producers of Oregon.

It is his opinion that Ontario ought to capitalize on her possibilities in the dairy industry.

"If a bunch of dairy cattle was built up here it would make possible a big saving of capital to this county, that now goes out of the state and never returns," said Mr. Clark to the Argus, Monday evening.

"Think what it would mean to establish a cheese factory, a big creamery, and an ice cream plant in Ontario?"

"The aggregate spent annually for these three items alone probably amounts to nearly thirty thousand dollars that ought to stay right here in Ontario and vicinity. Some one should get busy, and start a dairy herd and encourage it in others, and build up a pay roll that would mean more people employed; more homes to maintain; more schools, etc. Now is the time to get under way. It is comparatively easy to do it, if only a start is made it will draw support from others."
