## BEN ODELL WITH THE WATCH ON THE RHINE

Former Ontario Boy in the Army of Occupation Writes of Conditions in Germany—Lives in Old Castle.

Mrs. Robert Odell, formerly of this city but now a resident of Westfall sent the Argus the following letter from her son Ben, who is with the army of occupation in Germany. The young man says:

Bekond, Germany,  
Feb. 23, 1919

Dear Mother:

As this is Sunday and no place to go will try and write you a few lines. I received letters from you and John, also one from Amy a few days ago.

We have moved from Luxem to Bekond since you last heard from me. The people here act pretty independent toward us, but as there are lots of pretty girls its not so bad a place after all.

Tomorrow is my birthday, would like mighty well to be home but that is impossible but maybe I can be there when the next one comes. I suppose Dad and John are busy lambing now. Did John quit school?

There are not many of us left in our bunch any more. I am with a pack train now, have fifty mules and pack outfits for them, so expect to be busy for a while. Frost and I are still together, we have a nice warm room and are fine and dandy.

The cold weather seems to be over here, the snow having been gone for about two weeks. It was pretty cold for a while. It has been raining during the last week but is nice and warm.

This is a very old town. The buildings are very large. They tell us the building where our kitchen is, is two hundred years old. It is a regular castle, has in the past been a swell place but is falling to pieces now.

As it is nearly time to take care of the mules will close for this time.

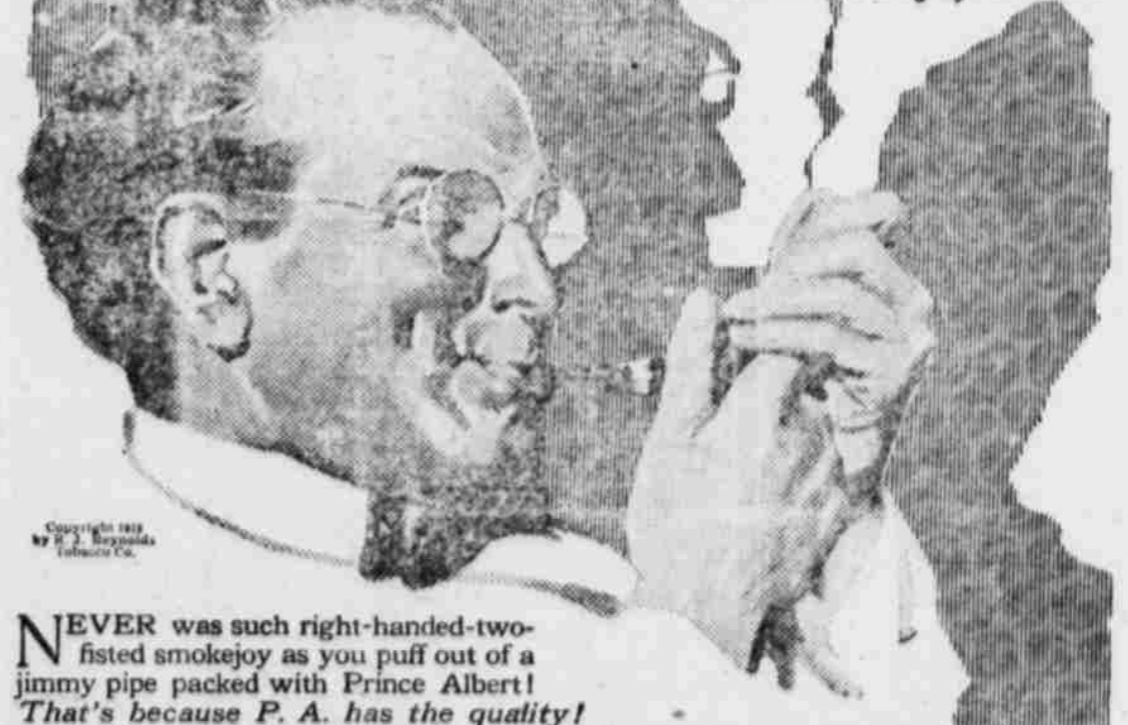
