VETERAN EDUCATOR CLAIMED BY DEATH

William Patton Lowry Aged 90 years Dies at Home of His Daughter, Mrs. Dalton Riggs Sunday Night.

After the illness of several months following injuries received when he was struck by an irate goat on the Biggs ranch last fall, William Patton Lowry, 90 years old died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Dalton Riggs, Sunday night.

Death was not caused by the injuries, but the inactivity resulting from the broken hip he suffered hastened the work of declining years. The funeral was held from the Baptist church Tuesday morning, interment being made in the Ontario cemetery.

Professor Lowry as he was known to his friends and those of the family came to Ontario to live with his daughter several years ago after rounding out an active life in school work in Bowling Green, Missouri, to which city he moved when a young man following his graduation from Exter Academy in Maine, his native state. His birthplace, was Winthrop, where he was born in 1828.

At Bowling Green he married Mary Fries, and to them six children were born, three of whom survive him. They are: Mrs. Dalton Riggs, and Mrs. Kathie Reider, of Ontario and Rowland Lowrey at St. Louis, Mo.

the week previous where the mass meeting was called.

Road legislation and road fund conditions were discussed by Senator Julien A. Hurley, and later by Representative P. J. Gallagher. Both upon the necessity of voting bonds if Malheur county is to share in the division of road funds.

R. A. McHaley, and M. Durkheimer of Prairie City, representing the Prairie City Commercial club were called upon to state the desires of the residents on the other side of the mountains relative to the John Day Highway and to tell what has been done toward its completion and finance. This they did. They declared that the people of the John Day Valley want the road completed at once and that a vast majority want the road to go from Prairie City to Unity via Reynolds creek, and voted bonds for that purpose.

Following their addresses, and talks by various members present at the meeting Judge Wood offered his resolution and it carried unanimously.

One of the features of the gathering was the good road talk made by F. M. Northrup of Dead Ox Flat. He roused the gathering with his enthusiastic appeal for good roads, and declared that he was "for the road bonds, even tho a road program might be laid out that would not pay one of the highways by his door."

J. R. Blackaby urged the necessity of having a big delegation sent to Portland to represent the county at the meeting of the State Highway Commission on April 15, and especially urged that the County Court be made members of the Committee a large; while each community send as many delegates as possible; a motion finally carried for that purpose. Each community will finance the expenses of its delegates while the League will pay the expenses of the members of the County Court.

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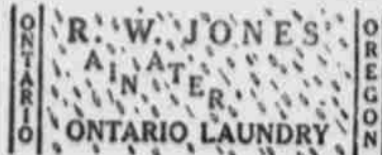
