THE VICTORY LOAN.

The success of the Victory Liberty Loan means that the people of the United States have not dropped the handles of the plow until the furrow is done.

The first four loans sent the boys to finish the job over there; the Victory Loan will bring the boys back to their job over here.

Security of principal, regularity of interest payment, and popularity as an investment are three recognized principals of bond investment. By this standard, does any investment in the world compare with the Victory Liberty Loan?

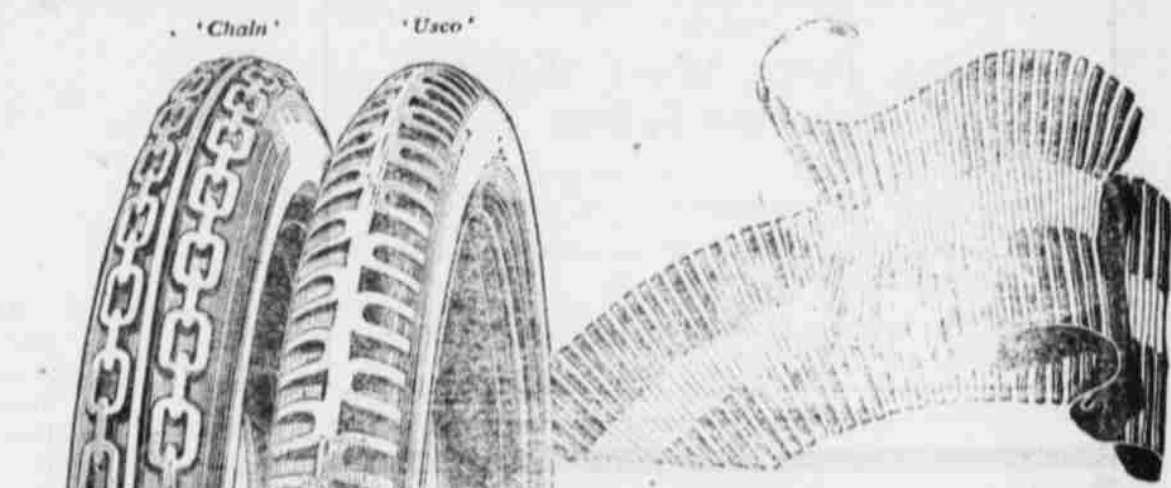
