### NOTICE OF CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given, that a Special City Election will be held in the City of Ontario, Malheur County, Oregon, at the usual voting places in the Precincts therein, on Tuesday, the 3rd day of June, A. D. 1919. That the polls for said election shall be opened at the hour of Eight o'clock a. m. of said day and remain open until Eight o'clock p. m., when they shall be closed.

That the appointed officers to conduct said election are as follows: Precinct No. 1—day board Judges: W. L. Hall, C. F. Loveland, Miss Bertha Van Patten. Clerks: Daisy Field and Florence Van Dyke. Night board Judges: Carl A. Field, A. A. Dunnuck and C. F. Hager. Clerks: O. H. Test and W. H. Laxon. Polling place, Lammy House on Oregon street.

Precinct No. 2—day board Judges: H. B. Cockrum, D. A. Grady and V. B. Staples. Clerks: Mrs. Emma Clemo and Joy Hustad. Night board Judges: John Landingham, H. H. Younglass and H. W. Climent. Clerks: F. J. Clemo and Mrs. Harriet Canfield. Polling place, City Hall.

Precinct No. 3—day board Judges: S. F. Taylor, L. Belle Lees, C. C. DeFrees. Clerks: Mrs. Anna Homan and Mrs. Hazel Smith. Night board Judges: G. K. Alken, E. W. Howland, C. R. Emison. Clerks: V. P. Brookover, C. F. Cox. Polling place, Studebaker Store.

That the object and purpose of said election is to submit to the qualified electors residing within the corporate limits of the said City of Ontario, Oregon, the question of whether or not Section 126 of the present City Charter be amended to read as follows, the words in parenthesis being the amended portion:

SECTION 126  
If within ten days of the service of the notice as prescribed in the foregoing Sections the sum assessed upon any lot or parcel thereof, is not wholly paid to the City Recorder, the council may thereafter, at any time it may see fit, (enforce the payment of any delinquent lien for street improvement or sidewalk construction or delinquent installment on bonded indebtedness made by reason of any assessment for sewer or street improvement, in the City of Ontario, by a suit in equity to foreclose any such lien or delinquent installment, in the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Malheur, in the like manner as mortgages on real estate are now foreclosed in said State, including service of summons by personal service or by publication, trial or default, findings, decree and final judgment, execution, levy by Sheriff, sale, certificate of sale to purchaser, confirmation, and redemption as now provided by law in mortgage foreclosures.

SECTION 126—A  
In all cases of a foreclosure under this Section, it shall be sufficient for the complaint to state, generally, the improvement or other matter for which the lien was made, a correct description of the property affected, the amount of the lien, and that the same was entered upon the Docket of City Liens, and has not been paid or discharged, and in case of bonded indebtedness on account of the improvement of streets or the laying of sewers, that the property has been bonded, and the amount of the installments due and unpaid. In all cases where the Court finds a lien has been perfected under the provisions of the Charter or Ordinances of said City, or that payments or interest upon any bonded indebtedness on account of the improvement of streets or the laying of sewers has not been paid when due, the Court shall enter a decree and judgment which shall include all amounts, penalties and interest required by such Charter, and Ordinances, and all expenses for former liens with costs and disbursements and shall allow a reasonable attorney's fee in such foreclosure proceedings.

SECTION 126—B  
At all sales on foreclosure under this Section, the City of Ontario,

Oregon, may become a purchaser, and shall be considered to have bid the full amount of the lien or delinquent payment in cases where the property has been bonded, together with the interest, penalty, costs and expenses of foreclosure thereon, including the attorney's fee allowed by the Court, and if no higher bid shall be received at such sale, the Sheriff shall execute a certificate of sale to the said City of Ontario, and said City shall acquire the title thereto, unless redeemed absolutely.

When the period of redemption shall have expired, the Sheriff shall execute to the holder of such certificate of sale, a deed to the property described therein, and such deed shall vest in the purchaser or holder of the certificate of sale, the title in fee thereto, and such title shall be superior to any lien, claim or charge whatever against the land, except a lien for a special assessment subsequent to that for which the land was sold under such foreclosure proceedings, and except a lien for State, County and School District taxes levied pursuant to law.

SECTION 126—C  
All redemptions made from any sale of real property under the provisions of the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Ontario, Oregon, shall be made by the same parties, at the same time and in the same manner as is now prescribed by Sections Nos. 244-245-246-247-248-249-250-251 and 252 of Lord's Oregon Laws relating to the redemption of real property from sales thereof.

SECTION 126—D  
That all Sections of the present City Charter, or parts of Sections thereof, in conflict with or inconsistent to said Section 126, as amended, be and the same are hereby repealed.

That all persons over the age of twenty-one years, who are not aliens and who are residents of the State of Oregon and who have resided within the corporate limits of the City of Ontario for at least six months next preceding said election shall be entitled to vote at such special election and not otherwise.

In the event that a majority of the qualified electors of the City of Ontario vote in favor of said amendment, the same shall be in full force and effect from and after the canvass of the votes at such election and the proclamation of the Mayor declaring the result of such election, and the Section of the Charter thereby amended and all Sections thereof in conflict with or inconsistent to said Section, as amended, shall become repealed, as originally adopted, and become void and of no effect.

Therefore, by resolution of the Common Council of the City of Ontario, Oregon, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said City of Ontario, this 10th day of May, A. D. 1919.
