turned home the next day.

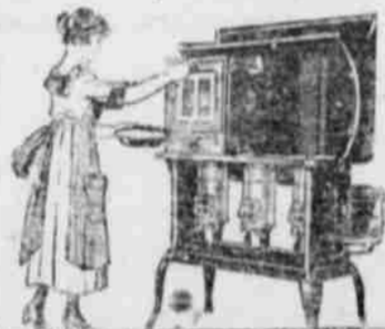
Mrs. Ayla Morrow of Jordan Val-

OPPOSITION APPEARS TO PAVING PROGRAM

right now is work and lots of it.
Good prices, even the high, are dis-
tributed all down the line and they
mean good prosperous conditions,
and certainly Ontario is prosperous.
"Tax levies are high here because
property valuations are low. They
are low because the practice over
in the Willamette valley is to put
values down there and if we put our
property values up to a ratio com-
pared with what people hold prop-
erty when they want to sell the levies
would be lower," continued the May-
or.

These are the arguments pro and
con, which no doubt will be heard at
the council session Monday evening.
It may be possible that the council
will adjourn its hearing of objections
until after the returns are in on the
road bond election; and it might en-
large the district to meet that objec-
tion, and otherwise endeavor to har-
monize the conflicting views, anyway
it will be an interesting session of
the city council that will hold forth
Monday evening.
