IDAHO HOME-COMING CELEBRATION; BOISE

Boise is planning the biggest celebration, in honor of the home-coming of the Soldier Boys, ever held in the State of Idaho. The plans contemplate three days' celebration—commencing Thursday, July 3, 4 and 5, with provisions made for suitable Sunday observances in the way of sacred concerts and other amusements for those desiring to stay over Sunday in Boise.

Beginning the morning of Thursday, July 3, band concerts will be held in many places over the city throughout the entire day.

Regular huts will be opened and maintained by the following organizations: Salvation Army, Knights of Columbus, Y. M. C. A. and the Red Cross. At all of these huts the Soldiers in uniform will find a real welcome and free entertainment.

There will be a base ball game, dances and special amusement features, among which may be mentioned the entire performance, afternoon and evening, of the Chautauqua for Thursday, having been purchased by the Committee, will be free to the public. The Chautauqua performance for this day is a particularly attractive one, featuring CIMERA'S CZECHO-SLOVAK BAND in Grand Concert; also MME. CAFARELLI in a very unusual and entertaining repertoire of Bohemian Folk Songs.

The White City has thrown open various special features during the entire day to all men in uniform, including the dance, scenic railway, joy wheel, fun factory, honeymoon trail, boats, ostrich farm and ocean wave. This is a special compliment accorded the men in uniform on the part of the management of the White City.

In addition to the above there will be many other features, which the various committees are still at work on, but up to this time definite arrangements have not as yet been made.

General information headquarters have been established at the Y. M. C. A. rooms, where General Secretary "Dick Randall" will be in charge, which assures that all visitors will receive the very best of courteous treatment. This will be the place to find accommodations, hotels, rooms, meals, etc., in fact, it will be General Information Headquarters, and visitors desiring information with reference to any of the above, should get in touch with the Y. M. C. A. or "Dick Randall." It is suggested that those desiring to make reservations should do so at the earliest possible moment. The Committee wishes it specially understood that provision will be made for all.

In addition to the above, attention is called to the unusual provision made for the convenience and comfort of campers at Tourist Park where an electric kitchen is provided for the convenience of campers and facilities for washing cars and laundry, location, within three minutes walk of the stores, where groceries and provisions, etc., may be had, providing a beautiful camp environment with all of those "dreamed-of" accommodations to the campers.
