## WOOL SHIPMENTS FROM CRANE REACH GRAND TOTAL 25 CARDS

The town has been filled up the last two weeks (with wool buyers and sheepmen. The wool is coming in rapidly and will all be in and shipped by the 1st of July, says the Crane American.

Up to the present date 13 cars of wool have been shipped from this point, aggregating 340,000 pounds, and it is estimated that there will be 12 carloads more to ship.

Hamirez Bros. of Narrows had the largest clip, over 75,000 pounds; Ham Brown's clip was 48,000; Murchison & Robinson, 44,000. Jim Paul has just started shearing and estimates that his clip will be about 35,000 pounds.

The buyers have paid from 43 cents to 50 cents per pound, and has averaged 48 cents. All but two or three clips have either been sold or consigned. The Bolton-Bodmer warehouse has been a busy place for the past three weeks as the wool has all come in at once.

right on the bank of the Boise river. Special accommodations are being provided for the parking of automobiles. A good attendant will be in charge of each parking place.

Friday, July 4, will be the day upon which the Big Military parade will be the special feature. It is conservatively estimated that more than 2,000 returned Men in Uniform will be in this parade. The Boise band, Emmett band, Salvation Army band, fire and drum Corps and other musical organizations will be features of this parade.

The committee on floats reports that more than 40 floats will embellish the parade.

The following prizes are being offered for the best float:

1st prize of \$100 for the best decorated float, Boise.

2nd prize of \$50.00 for the best decorated float, from outside towns.

In addition to these features there will be the various civic and fraternal organizations and special features, making in all one "Never-to-be-Forgotten" spectacle in what will be, without question, the biggest parade ever witnessed in the State of Idaho—commemorating the "Victory" 4th of July in honor of the Home-Coming of our "Victorious" Boys. After the parade the Men in Uniform will be entertained at luncheon and dance at the Masque by the D. A. R. In the afternoon there will be a concert at Julia Davis park and Victory speeches by prominent men, good to listen to. At Cody park a baseball game between Boise and Caldwell. The Willard-Dempsey fight will be reported at the Liberty Gardens and at various other points during the day. Many other features of interest and entertainment, such as dancing and various other forms of entertainment, will be provided. In the evening there will be an unusually attractive display of fireworks, to which the public is invited, at Boise barracks grounds, where accommodations will be available for all.

Saturday, July 5th, in the morning there will be band concerts at various parks. In the afternoon baseball game, Boise vs. Payette; Chautauqua. The feature of the day's program will be an exceptionally unique decorated and illuminated automobile parade in the evening. The committee is offering a prize of \$100 for the best decorated passenger automobile in the parade. There will be a special prize of \$50 for the best decorated passenger automobile coming from outside points, in the parade. Mr. J. Parish, secretary of the Boise Auto Dealers' association, is chairman of the committee for this event. The parade will be followed by a Serpentine-Throwing festival and dancing.

Sunday, July 6th, will be observed by special church services and sacred concert at Julia Davis park. Baseball game, Boise vs. Caldwell, the Chautauqua, a swimming exhibition at the Natatorium, White City, and various other entertainment features.

## SCHOOL CHILDREN ARE ASKED TO HELP NATION

State Director C. S. Jackson Sounds Warning to Boys and Girls of Oregon Seeking Help to Save Crops.

Special appeal is being made to the school children of Oregon, now released from their school-room duties, to make the most of their vacation time, not only in play and relaxation, but in thrifty effort to earn and save during part of their holiday. Work for boys and girls in the fields, and the orchards and about home, will be more beneficial than complete idleness, and there will be few but who will seek and find opportunity to earn money now that their school books have been put aside for the next two or three months.

The Government in furthering the War Savings Stamp campaign at this time, is doing so, not so much for the purpose of raising money for governmental purposes, as to the end of inculcating habits of thrift in every person, that they may become better citizens, and that the United States may maintain in peace times the record for thrift it developed during the war.

In this connection a recent message to school children by Carter Glass, Secretary of the Treasury, is pertinent:

"I summon you to solve one of America's greatest financial problems: How to make permanent among our people the habit of thrift begun during the war. Your investments in War Savings Stamps helped win the war. The Victory has been won. Let us carry over into peace times two of the great lessons of the war—the value of thrift and the fact that good citizenship and interest in your government come from having a part in financing it. To you I trust the responsibility for making the future America a nation of thrift."
