WHY CATHOLICS VENERATE THE MOTHER OF JESUS

Quite consistent with Divine Providence economy, does God when selecting an individual for special mission, bestow, adequate graces and qualifications, thereby insuring the missions faithful fulfillment.

The hesitance of Moses to engage in his Divinely ordained labors, was counteracted by the Lord's assurance, "Fear not I will be in thy mouth, and will teach thee what thou shalt speak." John the precursor of Christ was sanctified in the material bosom to thereby prepare him for his future labors.

If consecration of Churches and material things is demanded for Divine Service, how can we conceive, "God's vessel of election" Mary, de-profanation.

Little wonder is it then, that the Holy Ghost, inspired the women spoken of in the gospel to exultingly exclaim to Christ, "Blessed is the womb that bore Thee, and the paps that gave Thee suck." What creature in all history enjoyed the paramount honors that were bestowed on Mary? Witness the personal dignity of Gabriel, the envoy, the character of the message, and the respectful language in which it was conveyed.

are all referred to Him.

In paying homage to Mary, we do in no way level the distinction between God and creatures but rather unite the praises of God with those of His dearest creatures. Would a father be jealous of the honors paid to his child, would Angelo be jealous of our admiration for the child of his ingenious brain. St. Peter's Paschica? Was it not God then that designed and adorned Mary's soul, His living temple, with the treasures we so admire. Who can sincerely accuse Him of such a mark of imperfection? We would be just as foolhardy to assert that the Sun, if it were intelligent, jealous of the golden clouds that envelop Him, that reflect His brightness and inaccessible splendor. Who will presume the Triune God to be jealous of our admiration of Mary, that flower whose petals, color, and delicious fragrance are but the fruits of that same Gods beneficent graces.

Jesus nestled in her arms at Bethlehem, He was her companion during the Egyptian exile, the lonely years of Nazareth, and she it was who heard His last sigh at the foot of the Cross on Golgotha. It is fitting that both names so united in the Creed, should find a spot in our hearts and flow successively from our lips. Why divorce in our prayers those names that were ever inseparable in life and death.

WILL THERE BE A SHORTAGE OF GASOLINE?

During the last year or two the total production of crude oil has not increased notably, although the demand has continued to grow. It is quite evident that unless new oil fields are discovered, the price of gasoline will probably not be lower than it is today.

The oil producers, refiners and automotive engineers are fully alive to the situation and are doing everything possible to arrive at a satisfactory solution. The oil producers are continually prospecting for new fields and refiners are bonding every effort to improve methods of refining which will result in the extraction of more gasoline from each barrel of crude oil refined, and the automotive engineers are ever improving automobile engines and systems of carburization so as to get the maximum power and mileage from each unit of gasoline consumed.

Motorists are often heard to complain about the quality of gasoline today when considered in the light of their experiences with this fuel some years ago. As a matter of fact, the gasoline of today is more powerful, although less volatile, than the gasoline of ten years ago. To go back to the gasoline of earlier days would be to accept a less power, but more highly volatile fuel, which would not permit of as large a production of gasoline as is possible under present methods.
