ONTARIO TO VOTE ON PAVING BONDS WEDNESDAY JULY NINTH (Continued From Page 1)

bids were called, to note the prices offered for the different classes.

In explaining the committee's report T. H. Moore said, speaking for himself, and other members, I want it clearly understood that your committee had nothing to do with the petitions presented here tonight, and that these petitions are no part of our report. However for myself I feel that in view of the sentiment of many citizens that a change should be made.

In Executive Session.

At this point the Council went into executive session to consider the petition and the report of the committee. The session lasted for nearly two hours. Beside the councilmen the only persons present were Messrs. Blackaby and Van Petten, Mr. Moore having left the meeting earlier in the evening.

At the session it was announced by Mayor R. W. Jones that no vote was taken on the direct question of engaging or discharging Mr. Kelly, who is not under formal contract with the city to do the engineering work on the paving program. But the Council did instruct Mayor Jones to wire to engineering firms whose names he could learn, immediately, to learn the fees they would charge for doing the work.

On the question of fees the Council was apparently agreed that for the time taken to do the work five percent was a high fee, but also believed that no well-known engineering firm or engineer could be secured for less, according to the reports of the executive session given the Argus.

Go Ahead Say Property Owners.

At the meeting last Thursday, preceding the passage of the paving ordinance and following Mr. Leese's request for delay until next spring, H. C. Bayer, E. A. Fraser also asked the program be delayed until next spring. They declared it their belief that the time is so short to get the work done before cold weather. They all urged that the Council proceed, pass the paving ordinance, sell the bonds and get the preliminaries settled, since the city had so far committed itself and then call for bids for the work to start on March 1, 1920.

J. R. Blackaby, E. C. Van Petten and L. J. Aker each urged that the city proceed to get the work done. They argued that no real benefit would accrue thru delay, that the first payment on the bonds would still be a year away and that many contingencies might arise to defer the paving indefinitely.
