FIRES LOCATION TO BE GIVEN BY ALARM

On Advice of Fire Chief Council Changes Order for Fire Alarm—City to be Divided into Districts—Ask Kelsey's Resignation.

In the near future when a fire alarm is sounded it will tell in what part of the city the fire is located. This is to be done by the new fire alarm system which was ordered by the City Council at the adjourned meeting held Tuesday evening in the Council chambers at the City Hall.

Fire Chief Louis Kroessin beat the matter to the attention of the council by submitting a proposition from the Baldwin Alarm company to deliver this modern device for \$200. The other type of alarm, which gave no signal showing location was offered at \$145, so after some debate the Council ordered the district alarm device. Mr. Kroessin announced that the department would install the alarm and arrange for a convenient division of the city so that when an alarm is sounded everyone will know where the fire is.

Ask Engineer's Resignation

On Monday evening at 6 o'clock the regular meeting was held. In the absence of Mayor R. W. Jones, H. B. Cochrane, president of the Council, presided. At this meeting a proposition to do the engineering work for the street paving was received from Guy McGee of Caldwell. The offer was confidential but it is known that it was a substantial reduction over the five per cent asked by Louis C. Kelsey. No action was taken on Mr. McGee's proposition, the council believing that it should investigate other offers made before entering into a contract.

In an executive session at that time the Council voted to request the resignation of Louis C. Kelsey as City engineer and to notify him that it did not desire his services further. This followed a report of the special committee which was previously instructed to see him and learn what he would take for the work he has already done on the paving proposition.

Councilman Irwin Troxell who saw Mr. Kelsey while he was here for a short time on July 3, reported that Mr. Kelsey would not entertain a proposition of any kind. Mr. Troxell reported that he had asked Mr. Kelsey how long he would be in the city so that with the other members of the committee, Councilman W. H. Laxon and A. L. McDowell, he could take the matter up with him again. "Mr. Kelsey said he would be here for three or four days," said Mr. Troxell, "but when we went to see him the next day we were informed that he left on No. 19 the night before."

With this information before it the Council in executive session took the action noted above.

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MAY CHANGE WAR SAVINGS STAMPS INTO CERTIFICATES

San Francisco, July 8—The War Loan Organization of the Twelfth Federal Reserve District has just been advised that hereafter War Savings Stamps may be converted into Savings Certificates of \$100 and \$1000 denominations according to a new plan of the Savings Division of the U. S. Treasury Department to afford greater convenience in handling War Savings Securities.

The development of the War Savings idea is one that has been urged for sometime in order to attract larger investments. The holder of a sufficient number of Thrift Stamps

may now exchange them for a \$5 War Savings Stamp and in turn the holder of twenty of the \$5 War Savings Stamps may convert them into a \$100 Savings Certificate or the holder of two hundred of the \$5 Stamps may turn them in for a \$1000 Savings Certificate.

Conversion may be made at all first and second class postoffices and at all banks and trust companies that have qualified as agents of this second class. The Treasury Savings Certificates are to be issued in registered form and will bear the names of the owners. They will yield four per cent compounded quarterly as do the War Savings Stamps. The

limit of the individual investment still remains at \$1000.

The new Treasury Savings Certificates should prove particularly attractive for the investment of the funds of fraternal societies, labor unions and other civic, social and religious organizations because the interest is added to the principal automatically each quarter, the entire amount being payable at maturity.
