

AT BOARD'S REQUEST DOUGLASS WILL STAY

Superintendent of Schools Withdraws Resignation and Will Again Head School System—Declining University Professorship.

Advices were received this week by the members of the School Board that H. R. Douglass would withdraw his resignation and again head the Ontario schools. This action followed communications sent him by the board declaring its desire to reject his withdrawal on such short notice prior to the opening of the school year.

The position taken by the board was, that with but a few weeks remaining before the opening of school that all of the desirable men for such a position were engaged or the number so limited that the board would not be in a position to investigate the merits of possible candidates.

When this view of the situation was presented to Mr. Douglass he at once wrote that if the board took that position he would withdraw his resignation, and did so in a later letter.

Mr. and Mrs. Douglass and family are expected home today from Blue Mountain Springs where they have been spending a portion of the vacation season.

ence of the disease came last Saturday when Mr. Crane came to Ontario for medical attention. Dr. Whitney, whom he consulted, diagnosed the case as Anthrax and elicited the information that one of Crane's cows had died the Tuesday preceding after a very peculiar illness that lasted but a few hours.

Crane admitted, too, that he himself had held an autopsy on the animal. In this manner it is believed he contracted the disease.

When Crane's condition became more serious on Monday he was taken to the Holy Rosary Hospital where he is under going treatment and is believed to be recovering.

On Tuesday night of this week another of the cows on the Crane ranch died and soon afterward a dog. Dr. A. G. Moore was called for and he confirmed the belief of Dr. Whitney that the cattle died of Anthrax.

This is the first time this disease has been known in this section and the State officials have been notified so that steps can be taken to prevent the spread of the disease.

NOT EVEN A PUNCTURE NAILS GREAT TRIP TO YELLOWSTONE

Returning on the same air with which they started from Ontario ten days previously, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Fraser reached Ontario last Friday evening from the Yellowstone National Park, the Twin Falls region and other points of interest in Southeastern and Southern Idaho.

"Not even a puncture spoiled any part of the trip," said Mr. Fraser, "and we enjoyed every minute. The worst roads we travelled on during the entire trip was that between Ontario and Nyssa. Of course the going was not all smooth, but generally speaking the roads were fine.

divide the water by the agency of the State Water Master is the report.

The fact that there has not been a just division of the company's water is patent, declare the ranchers on this end of the canal. They point to the fact that while the ranchers on the lower end are harvesting normal second crops, on this end the crops will be vastly below normal.

As the result of the water shortage on the Owyhee this year many of the stockholders are arguing that the principal trouble is due to lack of management, and are urging the election of a general manager for the system.

It is their argument that of necessity the board of directors can not leave their ranches and look after the many interests of the company, and that some one efficient man should be secured. They point to the success of the Shoestring Ditch to sustain their argument and are determined that a change be made in the Owyhee system, which they further say, is the most important institution in the entire county.

Efforts are now being made to secure the services of a general manager for next year. In the mean time Mr. Sproule has charge of the water distribution and has employed Engineer Ivan E. Oakes to measure out the waters of the canal.
