PARK TO PARK ROAD
GIVEN ENDORSEMENT

moth Hot Springs in Yellowstone Park on August 10 and 11, for the development of plans for the promotion of well established highway connecting the great National parks of the country and to direct the attention of the people of the United States to this means of seeing and enjoying their vast recreation areas and for the upbuilding of the tourist business of the west and with it the commercial and agricultural advancement of the country.

"A number of years ago there was formed 'The National Park-to-Park Highway association' of which Gus Holms of Cody, Wyoming, is chairman. The highway when completed will pass through nine of the largest cities in the United States, embracing 4000 miles of scenic road connecting the ten national parks and passing 23 National Monuments.

"At the roll-call on the afternoon of August 10th, your delegates stated whom and what they represented and advocated a direct east and west line between Crater Lake and Yellowstone Parks, through Central Oregon and across Idaho. Superintendent Albright advocated 'cut-offs' as it would be impossible, especailly for a busy man, to complete, without break, a tour of the entire 'Incomparable Circle,' and we are pleased to report that a resolution adopted by the National Parks Touring Association on August 11, and forwarded to the Hon Secretary of the Interior and to each representative in congress from the western states, recommending the construction of a road by the government from Crater Lake to connect with the Central Oregon highway.

"Attention is called to the fact that it is proposed to establish a National Park near Boise, Idaho, and if such be established it is beyond any question of a doubt that a Park-to-Park Highway will connect Yellowstone with Boise and thence west to Crater Lake, but irrespective of whether coming over a Park highway or the Central Oregon highway, tourists will enjoy the opportunity of viewing 'Finley's Wonderwater' and the Alps (Steens Mountain) of Harney county on the trip.

"Statistics show that the minimum cash per car left at each stop is \$7.00, without considering hotel business, and the traffic is getting more extensive each year and all cash."




