THREE BRONZE STARS TELL ACTION STORY

Member of Famous 6th Marines Home Again—Had 27 Days of Fighting in St. Mihiel, Champagne and Argonne.

On the little band of ribbon, made up of the various colors of the allied armies there are three bronze stars, suspended below the ribbon is the medal of a sharp shooter. These are the only indications that Theron Northrup, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Northrup of Dead Ox Flat has to show for the month of active fighting he saw in France—but they are sufficient.

Young Northrup came home last week and tho he has, so he says, nothing to tell about the action he saw, and declares that in all of the fighting the majority of the Hunns he saw "were on the run back for the Rhine," or "clawing the air with their hands yelling 'Kamerad'," yet it is evident despite his modesty that he was in the fighting sure enough.

The three little stars indicate the participation in major offensives, one for each of these, Northrup was with the famous Marines in the St. Mihiel, Champagne and Argonne. At one time he was under fire 21 days, another three and another four. The Marines were shock troops, and did not have to hold lines.

After the armistice was signed he was located at Coblenz, Germany, and had an opportunity to see the famous scenes on the Rhine, for he was assigned to duty on an excursion boat that ran up and down that famous river.

"The Germans apparently did not consider themselves beaten in battle," was one of his observations. "I talked to many of them who declared that they quit because they ran out of food and raw materials, and thus they ascribed their defeat to the blockade which the fleets maintained."

After his discharge from the service he started west and visited for a few days in Nebraska.
