estimated amount hauled into Jordan Valley this year, and with adequate highways the tonnage would be much greater, for it would stimulate development.

In a letter to J. R. Blackaby concerning this matter, George Quayle, general secretary of the State Chamber says:

"Please advise me by return mail how much money has been set aside for the construction of this road from Ontario south, and I should like to have you outline the route if a survey has been made. Would also like to know from what fund this road money is coming. I believe you told me but I forgot whether or not it was County money or from some State road funds. I wish you would give me in detail all the facts you have regarding this whole proposition. As soon as these facts are made known to me I will get the American Automobile Association busy. If the Oregon State Highway Commission has expressed their opinion regarding this road, I wish you would give me their viewpoint."

"I have talked this matter over with a few people and the question has been raised that in case a good road was constructed into Nevada it might take the trade of your territory into that State. That does not make any difference to the State Chamber of Commerce. It is our endeavor to get roads built in Oregon that will be of benefit to the different communities in our State and if the trade goes to Nevada, let it go to Nevada—if it goes to Idaho, let it go to Idaho, but we believe that you should have roads whether they lead to Portland or not."

The following is the letter which E. M. Bosch, secretary of the Winnemucca business men's association wrote Mr. Quayle which together with other agitation from T. T. Kahout and Mr. Blackaby started the State Chamber official's action:

"We have your letter of August 13th, relative to Road conditions north of our City, and in the vicinity of Jordan Valley.

"You have hit upon an idea that we have been working upon for some time, as if a Good Highway could be constructed from our city to Jordan Valley, it would mean a great deal to both communities, in fact, it is a necessity that commands immediate attention, but our funds are very limited at the present time, and we can not do much this year, however we expect to be on the job next year, and shall be pleased to know just what you can do in fixing up the road from the Nevada State line to Jordan Valley.

"This road if put in good condition, should mean a saving of over 400 miles in travel from Boise to our city, as most travel goes by way of Ogden, Utah, and therefore would be a short cut to California points.

"If you will have Mr. T. T. Kahout get in touch with us, or anyone else in Jordan Valley who is interested in the matter, we will be pleased to co-operate with them."
