Excellent Program Offered for Five Evenings—No Program Sunday Evening—Three Lectures—Two Musical Evenings.

Ontario's third annual festival of Chautauqua evenings will start Friday evening, October 17 with Tom Corwine, the humorist par excellence. On the following evening Ontario will hear Marshall Lewis Mertins, the post humorist of the Kansas City Star, will present his lecture, "Gold at the Rainbow's End," and other sketches.

On Monday evening the offering will be the concert of the Chicago Artist Trio, a harpists, pianist and reader. Tuesday evening Major Thornton Mills will deliver his famous lecture, "Fiddies and Fortune," and the closing number will be the concert of the Sierra Serenaders, five talented girls.

### SWAGLER TO MANAGE RED CROSS ROLL CALL

Organization Perfected for Annual Membership Drive—Much work Remains to be done—Would Reduce Debts.

R. W. Swagler returned last Thursday evening from Portland, where he attended a meeting of the various representatives from the Red Cross Chapters throughout Oregon, Idaho and Washington, in preparation for the annual roll call which takes place from November 2 to 9th.

In discussing the meeting, Mr. Swagler said, "Dr. Farrand of New York City, who made the main address at both meetings was a very inspiring speaker. He urged the necessity of maintaining the American Red Cross as a permanent institution in our national life. There still remains many war obligations to meet, and this year one of the main objects to be achieved by the Red Cross is the start of a campaign to reduce the number of deaths from preventable causes, by means of intelligent cooperation with the various bureaus of health, the furnishing of nurses where needed, and a campaign of education designed to eliminate the dangers of plagues."

"Then too, whenever a catastrophe like the recent Corpus Christi disaster occurs, by means of a business-like organization such as the Red Cross relief can be immediately sent through systematic channels prepared for immediate succor. Earl Kilpatrick, chief of the N. W. division and Mrs. Fox, a travelling Red Cross nurse were also present and delivered very interesting addresses on the future activities and needs of the Red Cross."

### COUNTY AGAIN RETURNS WINNER FROM FAIR

Averitt Hickox and Katherine Boswell Maintain Records Set by Previous Contestants—Take Two Blue Ribbons.

That Malheur county won two blue ribbons at the State Fair is the information that comes from Mrs. Fay Clark Hurley, county superintendent of schools. Averitt Hickox and Katherine Boswell who represented the county in the competition with the other boys and girls of the state proved worthy successors of the predecessors from this region. In telling of their work at Salem, Mrs. Hurley says:

"Averitt Hickox and Katherine Boswell, the two Malheur County club members who won the free trip to the State Fair were both awarded blue ribbons at the State Fair and are entitled to attend the boys' and girls' summer school to be held at O. A. C. next June. Averitt won over all of the corn club boys in the State of Oregon and Katherine over the cooking and baking club girls. Hundreds of children were competing for these prizes. The fact that our representatives were State Fair winners certainly justifies the judgment of our own county fair judges."

"For one hundred per cent of the representatives from any county to carry away capital prizes at the State Fair is very unusual and we should be proud of these bright youngsters."

### LAST OF FIRST GROUP OF VOLUNTEERS BACK IN CITY

Herb Paul, the last of the first group of stalwart volunteers who left Ontario on April 10, 1917, to join the Kaiser, is back on his old job at the O. S. L. freight station. Paul is the only one of that group who wears scars of battle wounds, and he has a pair of them.

The story of his second wound is one of the most thrilling, at the same time humorous that the boys of Ontario have brought home with them. It happened thus:

With a bunch of his pals he was lying behind a little ridge in the Argonne with Boche planes bombing now and then from overhead, and Boche artillery landing shells too close for comfort. An old German piano was located in the open a few yards to the rear, and the boys thought that a safe place for a concert—at least it was no hotter than the hole behind the hill—so they gathered around while one of the jazz artists of the group tickled the ivories and the rest did a barbershop chord. The harmonizing was given an exit cue by a Heinie flyer who dropped a bomb on the opera troop. A shell fragment sent several of the boys "West," but Paul escaped with a wounded thigh which sent him back to the hospital.

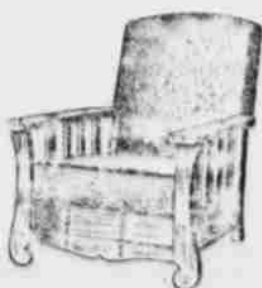
