As each obstacle is surmounted another objection presents itself, so that is prone to ask the question whether or not any building will actually be commenced this year. Strange as it may appear but still, none the less true, Ontario is the only town on the O. S. L. that has no buildings under way; or I believe I am safe in saying that ours is the only city in Oregon that has not erected some houses this year. Now why is this? Are we afraid that after all Ontario is not destined to be the great city we anticipated? It would look that way from the lack of faith shown if the reluctance to build homes was any criterion.

Reviewing the situation during the past few months: The main topic of conversation on the street corner, in the home, in the office and store has been what are we going to do to relieve the house problem? Some suggested organizing a local Home Building Association. This was done but sufficient capital was not forthcoming to construct even a small shack. Others said let's find out how many want to build and combine our orders for materials and get a reduced price. This too was carried out—over thirty prospective builders signed an agreement promising to commence building operations within a certain period. Then the hue and cry was raised about the high price of building material and how the builder was being held up by the local yards. The local yards promised to meet all competition which was a very fair proposition but no definite prices for them to go by were submitted, only talk in a general way, and time pressed; I went to outside points and secured the wholesale prices from mills and when presented to the local yards obtained the assurance that the same prices would be met if the orders were grouped and placed in car lots; in fact your local lumbermen are willing and anxious to do their part toward en-

couraging a building activity; but now the question of securing contractors and help has arisen. Outside contractors have heard of this movement and are here to bid on the business; what next will be the excuse? I suppose it will be too late to do anything this year but will be postponed until the spring, and when spring comes delayed until another fall. Let's wake up, quit talking and do something! Do you realize that we have lost lots, you actually lost over fifty families this summer through not having houses for them to move into. Say the average family spends \$1,500 per year then in dollars and cents we have turned away from Ontario \$75,000 in actual cash to say nothing of the influence and hard feelings engendered against Ontario; and a knock is far more reaching than a boost.

To your Commercial Club belongs the credit for originating the idea of getting the thirty odd signers to build homes; but so far the matter rests there; it cannot erect the home for you. Salem took a lesson from us and started a plan to get one hundred signers to a like resolution; the signers were secured and building on some of the homes have already commenced; where we are still talking and getting nowhere. Daily families are coming here but leaving due to the lack of accommodations. Let's be up and doing!

Now listen; it is conceded that the year 1913 was a normal year and lumber prices are only 50 per cent higher than normal; whereas flour is 200 per cent higher, shoes 100 per cent higher, clothing almost 75, wages 100 to 150 per cent higher.

Why use the stock objection? If Ontario is ever to be a big city then it has to be made so from within and not without.

FAMOUS DANCERS
IN MARCUS SHOW

Mlle. Yvonne Vallal and Mons. Roland Zermain Prominent in "Oh Baby"

A. B. Marcus, producer of "Oh Baby" which will come to the Wheaton, Weiser, on Tuesday, Oct. 21, put over a shrewd deal when he engaged the celebrated French dancers Mlle. Yvonne Vallal and Mons. Roland Zermain as features of the current Marcus extravaganza. His rivals for their services were Les Shubert, of the New York Winter Garden and Florenz Ziefell of the "Follies." Messrs. Marcus, Shubert and Ziefell were all in Paris in March looking for foreign dancing talent.

Mlle. Vallal at the time was appearing at the Folies Bergere in a ballet called "La Danse d'Eve." She could not be persuaded to leave France without her former partner, Mons. Zermain who was still in uniform of an aviator. Red tape in France is even more complicated than it is here. Shubert and Ziefell decided to wait until Zermain was discharged from the army.

Foxy Marcus took time by the forelock and received a promise from Zermain to join the Marcus forces if his release from the army could be secured. Marcus had come in contact with a number of American notables through his entertainments in the training camps last season. By pulling wires here and there the French authorities were prevailed on to release Zermain. As fate would have it Marcus, Mlle. Vallal and Mons. Zermain came over on the George Washington with President Wilson, arriving in New York early in July.

Mlle. Vallal and Mons. Zermain have appeared at the Opera Comique, Paris, and before the war were for two seasons court dancers to the Czar of Russia. They staged the spectacles in "Oh Baby," including "The Gates of Araby," "The Artist's Model" and "Danse d'Eve."

Five Day Delivery Plan

Which was evolved during the War, by the War-Board and the Laundry-Owners' National Association, and which is rapidly being adopted by most of the larger and more progressive laundries of the country.

The principal differences from our present system are as follows:

The work is picked up one-half day earlier and delivered one-half day later.

The work is picked up in the afternoon and delivered in the morning.

The City is divided into routes and there is One Day Only for gathering work on each route.

The advantages of the plan are that our work will be spread out evenly throughout the whole week instead of being bunched up into the first three or four days, our workers will have Saturday afternoons, off we will have work in the plant to start Monday morning, you will be more apt to be at home when your bundle is delivered, you will have more time to get your bundle ready, and, barring serious accidents, you will always get your bundle the day you expect it.

In case there are times when our regular service is inconvenient to you, you may have service on any other day by bringing your bundle to our plant and calling for it when finished.

Our routes will be as follows:

- Route No. 1. gather Saturday afternoon, deliver Thursday morning.
- Route No. 2 gather Monday afternoon, deliver Friday morning.
- Route No. 3 gather Tuesday afternoon, deliver Saturday morning.
- Route No. 4 gather Wednesday afternoon, deliver Monday morning.
- Route No. 5 gather Thursday afternoon, deliver Tuesday morning.
- Route No. 6 gather nothing Friday afternoon, deliver nothing Wednesday morning.
- Route No. 1. That part of town South of the street running from the P. O. to the Hospital, Villa Park and Terrace Heights.
- Route No. 2. Business District, Vale, Homedale, and Adrain.
- Route No. 3. Parma, Nyssa, Brogan, Jamieson, Riverside, Juntura, Crane Burns, Voltage, Harper, Fruitland and New Plymouth.
- Route No. 4. Business district and that part of the old townsite North of the street running from the P. O. to the Hospital.
- Route No. 5. East-side, Riverside Addition and Vale.
- Route No. 6. Reserved to take care of holidays, interruptions of the electric service, etc.
