Late Hay Crop Loses

A common practice of many alfalfa raisers is to cut off a crop of hay rather late in the fall or else to pasture the forage so heavily at this ime that adequate growth will not crop during the cold weather. The scant hay crop which the grower gains by this practice of late clipping in no respect repays him for the damage which he actually does to als stand of alfalfa. Every farmer should allow his alfalfa fields to grow at random, unmolested during the fall, as by this he is providing the essential warm winter clothe

Protecting Animals from Bloat
