Just 2737 Oregon cows were tested for milk production by the six testing association in August. Their average yield was 697.52 pounds of milk carrying 30.44 pounds fat. Big as this yield is it is far below the production of the best herd, which averaged 1392 pounds milk with 47.56 pounds fat. The heaviest milk producer was a Holstein cow giving 1779 pounds milk, and the biggest fat yielders were a Holstein and a grade Jersey giving 76.14 pounds each.
