This was the advise received by County Judge E. H. Test. and reported to the Comercial club at its meeting last night by L. R. Breithaupt of Dead Ox Flat, who with Frank M. Northrup and S. S. "It is hard to explain in detail what we want and while most of you are familiar with the country up there, there are many who are not and we want you to come, all of you, or as many as possible, to go over the route with ug."
