## SCOTTISH RITE LODGE FOR EASTERN OREGON

High Degrees of Masonry to be Conferred at Baker—Dispensation For Perfection Lodge is Secured.

Dispensation has been received by the Scottish Rite Masons of Baker from the most Eminent Phillip S. Malcolm Thirty-third Degree, the Sovereign Inspector General of the Scottish Rite Bodies of Oregon to confer the Degrees from the 4th to the 14th inclusive, and to institute a Lodge of Perfection in Baker designated Eastern Lodge of Perfection, having concurrent jurisdiction with Portland, Oregon.

At present this will be the only Lodge of Perfection instituted between Boise and Portland that will be invested with the power and authority to confer the higher degrees of Masonry. In addition of being made members of the Lodge of Perfection, many will receive the degree of Rose Croix, Chapter Council of Kadosh and Consistory. Having attained these succeeding degrees they will be entitled to share the honors and privileges of 32 degree Masons, a privilege highly coveted by Masons. In the near future the largest class in the history of Eastern Oregon will receive these honors. In attendance at this ceremony will come Masons from adjacent points, Canyon, John Day, Prairie, Sumpter, Joseph, Enterprise, La Grande, North Powder, Union, Ontario, Nyssa, Halfway and Cornucopia. This promises to be a function of some magnitude and importance.

Inspector General Malcolm will set a definite date in a few days of his intended official visit to Baker.
