

PIONEER DENTIST PASSES AWAY AFTER LONG ILLNESS

After an illness of several months duration Dr. Clinton E. Frye died Thursday evening, November 13. Funeral services were held from McDowell's chapel Saturday afternoon, Rev. Chas. H. Blom of the Baptist church officiating.

Dr. Frye was born in Iowa 63 years ago and came to Ontario more than 20 years ago to engage in the practice of his profession. For many years he made Ontario his headquarters and travelled thru the interior. Several years ago he took an office in Ontario and practiced his profession here. He sold his office and practice about a year ago to Dr. A. R. Roberts.

Dr. Frye is survived by four brothers and two sisters, who live in Iowa.

that Mr. Lytle be named instead. E. E. McCabe of Vale was introduced and told of the work of the American Legion and of the necessity of the business men of every community backing the ex-service men in their work. He especially urged that Ontario get behind the

movement for the formation of a legion post here.

Mr. McCabe was followed by G. K. Aiken, who furthered McCabe's proposal and asked that specific resolutions be drawn condemning the I. W. W. activities and urging the rigid enforcement of laws for the suppression of radicalism in America. He urged too that resolutions be drawn endorsing the Johnson emigration measure and declaring the club's stand as out and out opposition to all unAmerican measures and the condemnation of all radicals be they foreigners or American born.

Col. S. F. Taylor moved that a committee be appointed to draw the resolution suggested by Mr. Aiken, with the latter as chairman. This motion prevailed.

E. C. Van Petten gave a report on the good roads committee that had in charge the request of the Dead Ox Flat committee for co-operation in securing the route desired across Dead Ox Flat. Mr. Van Petten reported that after two trips across the Flat, the last with the Highway engineers, a satisfactory route had been secured.
