PARENT-TEACHERS ON DEAD OX FLAT MEET

Association Formed—Road Route Viewed—Land on Flat in Demand—Several Deals Made During Past Week.

A meeting at the Park School house on Friday evening the 14th, resulted in the organization of a Parent-Teachers Association with a charter membership of twenty. Mr. Tom Heslop was elected president, Mrs. L. R. Breithaupt, vice-president, and Miss Cescentia Glatt, secretary-treasurer. Much benefit is expected from the work of this organization in bringing about a closer understanding between parents and the teachers and team-work for the benefit of the children and improvement of the school. It is hoped that all parents with children in school will become members of the association.

State Highway Engineers Bennett, Harrington and Drinkall, accompanied by County Judge, E. H. Test, went over the route of the Ontario-Huntington section of the Columbia Highway on the 15th. They were accompanied across Dead-Ox Flat by members of the Dead Ox Highway committee, Messrs. Boals, Hill Guttridge and Breithaupt, who pointed out the merits of the favorite route of the residents of this section. Mr. Bennett gave it as his opinion that this route would be acceptable.

Dead-Ox Flat is beginning to feel the effect of the tide of real estate movement which has been sweeping over the Snake River Valley.
