



The Western States Reclamation Association has been organized as a result of the conference held November 21st and 22nd at Salt Lake City. Representatives from 13 of the reclamation states were present at the conference which was called for the purpose of crystallizing sentiment in the western states in favor of some definite plan of furthering Federal reclamation. The Association decided to request of congress an appropriation of \$250,000,000 to replenish the reclamation fund. Provision was made for an executive committee composed of one member from each state to carry out the recommendations of the association. State Engineer Percy A. Cupper was selected as executive committeeman from Oregon.


The first meeting of the executive committee was held in Salt Lake City the government's thrift work, have proposed to hold the next meeting in Washington, D. C., soon after the convening of congress. It is proposed to raise the necessary funds for carrying on the campaign by voluntary subscription. Oregon's allotment is \$3000.
