The information gathered in the ensus is for general statistical purposes, only and such information annot be used as a hasis for taxation. Nor can such information be used to harm any person in any way. This is pointed out in the President's proclamation.

the individual is lost as soon as the filled-out schedules are received at Washington. For upon reaching there the information is transferred from the sheets to cards. This is done by machinery and names are discarded entirely. Moreover, every person connected with the taking of the census is prohibited by Federal law from divulging any information given them in the performance of their duties.
