Pure bred sires increased grade herd production of 20 cows in South Dakota to the value of \$540 over that of grade herds from scrub sires. How the same principles are affecting production in Oregon, now leading in many lines of dairying and dairy breeding, will be pointed out in the dairy work at Farmers' Week beginning December 3. "Scrap scrub sires" is at the bottom of these principles.—From Department of Industrial Journalism, Oregon Agricultural College.
