PLOWING AIDS SCAB CONTROL Apple scab control is helped by plowing under the leaves while the trees are still dormant, say the O. A. C. plant pathologist specialists. The fungus that causes scab is carried over winter in the infected leaves, and is discharged in the air as a microscopic dust, which rises and lodges on the opening leaf and fruit buds. The discharge may continue as late as June. New spores are formed from the first attacks, continuing the disease until fall. Spraying with lime-sulfur, 1.25, just as the apple blossom clusters open ought to allow the spray to touch the clump of buds at the center, is said to be the most practical control measure. Oregon growers now save annually more than a million dollars a year by spraying for scab.
