THOUSANDS OF JACK RABBITS ERADICATED

Campaign by County Agent, Assisted by Biological Survey, Results in Death to Ranchers' Enemies Still at Work.

January has been an unfortunate month for Malheur county jack rabbits. The poison campaign started during the last days of December by the county proved so effective in the lower Malheur valley that it was decided to make it county wide. Some trouble was experienced in getting sufficient supplies of strychnine, but during the past three weeks the work has been pushed to all parts of the county. The organization work has been handled by the county agent, while representatives of the Biological Survey have assisted in preparing the poison and directing its use.

As a result, thousands of rabbits have been poisoned, and, while they could no doubt have been practically exterminated had it been possible to start the campaign a couple of months earlier, the saving of crops and range grass effected by the killings already made will amount to a figure hard to estimate. NYSSA AND ADRIAN START FARM BUREAUS

Ranchers Display Interest in Activities of Organization—Adrian Women Serve Elaborate Dinner.

The farmers of the Nyssa section completed the organization of their farm bureau on Saturday afternoon. Those in attendance listened to a very excellent address by W. W. Deal, master of the Idaho State Grange and an enthusiastic leader of the Canyon County Farm Bureau. F. L. Ballard, county agent leader for Eastern Oregon, explained the organization plan and workings of the farm bureau, after which new members were enrolled. Seven projects were then adopted for attention during the coming year. A community committee of seven was chosen to have charge of the work, each member of which is charged

with the execution of work connected with one project.

The meeting was businesslike and snappy from start to finish, and showed that the farmers of the Nyssa district are determined to put the work on a practical basis and expect to get results.

Adrian Elects Officers

The ladies of the Adrian neighborhood served a supper on Saturday night which was enjoyed by more than 100 persons. Organization of the Adrian community Farm Bureau took place immediately following the supper. A number of new members were enrolled and a plan of action for the ensuing year discussed and adopted. Election of committee to lead the projects resulted in the selection of L. E. Pillsbury for Live-stock Improvement; E. H. Brumback for Crop Improvement; Mr. Purdy for Soil Improvement and Irrigation; J. E. Holly for Pest and Disease Control; Mr. Beaumont for Cooperative Marketing, and Mr. Hatch for Community Betterments. This committee met at once and chose Mr. Hatch as chairman and Mr. Holly as secretary-treasurer.

BURNS IS STRICKEN WITH FLU EPIDEMIC

Reported to Be 150 Cases at Present—Dr. White and Two Nurses Arrive From Portland Monday, Leaving For Burns Tuesday.

Dr. White Elk, the noted Indian physician physician and Red Cross worker from Oklahoma, was at the Moore hotel Monday night, on his way to Burns, where he and other members of the profession have been endeavoring to cope with a "flu" epidemic which has been raging at Burns and vicinity for the past two or three weeks. The doctor was accompanied by his wife and two Portland nurses, Misses R. M. Decker and E. R. Cramley, but Miss Cramley was taken quite ill Monday night and her companion remained over to nurse her. A report has reached the Argus that there are 150 cases at present.

Dr. Elk has made his headquarters in Portland for some months. A year ago his work for the Red Cross was brought prominently before the nation in that he raised the first \$1,000,000 for that great organization in New York.
