

PIONEER WOMAN PASSES

After an illness of nearly three years' duration, which for nearly a year passed her confined to her home, Mrs. Sarah Francis Ryan, wife of Cornelius Ryan of this city, died at her home early this morning. Beside her husband she is survived by one daughter, Mrs. R. L. Scott, of this city, and her brother, John McGilvern, also of this city. Funeral services will be held from the Baptist church of which the deceased was a member, tomorrow afternoon at 2 p. m. Interment will be made in the Ontario cemetery.

Mrs. Ryan was born at Independence, Missouri, April 22, 1855, and grew to womanhood there. She was married to P. J. McGuigan and moved to California in the late seventies, and came to Malheur county, settling near Benth, where they took a homestead and developed a farm. Mr. McGuigan died in 1891. She continued to operate the place for a number of years, coming often to Ontario, where she had many friends.

In 1910 she was married in Boise to Con Ryan and they have made their home here since that time, acquiring a large interest in Ontario property and ranch lands in the tracts west of the city.

On last Wednesday evening the S. W. class of the Presbyterian Sabbath school held a business meeting at the home of Miss Dorothy Twiford. After the transaction of business a pleasant social time was enjoyed by all present. The hostess served delicious light refreshments.

Grant, Riverdale; A. A. Guttridge, Oregon-Slope; G. W. Dean, Cairo; P. Tensen, Nyssa; C. M. Bequimont, Adrian, and this committee nominated the following officers and suggested the following program of work: V. V. Hickox, Cairo, president; A. A. Guttridge, Oregon-Slope, first vice president; Arden Reed, Brogan, second vice president; C. F. Brumback, Adrain, secretary; V. T. Herrett, Vale, treasurer; Chairman of the following projects a follows: Frank Fry, Nyssa, Crop Improvements; S. P. Graham, Vale, Stock Improvement; G. W. Dean, Cairo, Pest and Disease Control; J. L. Hadley, Vale, Irrigation and Soil Improvement; Peter Tensen, Nyssa, Marketing; E. M. Dean, Nyssa, Community Betterments; Ivan E. Oakes, Cairo, Crop reporting.

Mr. Brumback declined to serve as secretary as did several others suggested and finally this position was filled by the nomination and election of L. R. Briethaupt, County Agent. With the ticket thus complete all offices were filled by acclamation.

Hear Many Addresses
Among the speakers heard by the ranchers were P. L. Ballard, director of extension work for O. A. C. in Eastern Oregon; who outlined some essentials of the program and served

as secretary of the meeting. It was largely due to Mr. Ballard's work that the bureau work was started in the county.

F. J. Gallagher of Ontario who is representing a number of the irrigation districts at the power rate hearing gave an outline of the status of the case, and emphasized the need for securing accurate data for presentation to the commission. Mr. Gallagher expressed the hope of the litigants that it would be possible to defer action in the proposed rise until after 1920 at least.

Oakes Speaks on Reports
Ivan E. Oakes, manager of the Owyhee Ditch presented a proposed plan for reporting crops and cited the benefits that will result thru this data being complete, not for the rancher alone but for the county and every community that seeks to induce settlers to come to buy land or establish industries.

"No manufacturer or business man could determine the selling price of his product with a knowledge of its cost to him," said Mr. Oakes, "and the same is true of the farmer. He should know which of his crops pay, and which do not, otherwise he will continue losing practices. It is therefore essential that accurate data be submitted. This is so important he declared that under many government irrigation projects it is part of the buyers contract and he must make the reports regularly."

After some discussion, Mr. Oakes recommendation carried.

Fire Prevention Urged
Horace G. Skyes, of the state fire marshal's office made a brief talk on fire prevention and urged the ranchers to protect their buildings and their crops. He especially urged that the smoking of cigarettes about hay stacks and barns be prohibited if possible. As the result of his talk, the many expressed the belief that it would be impossible to bring about this desired result, the following resolution was adopted:

Be it resolved by this first session of Malheur County Farm Bureau, that the Farmers represented in this organization do now, and henceforth, make a concerted effort to discourage and prevent careless smoking at all times about inflammable property, such as hay stacks, barns, garages, etc., and any other form of personal carelessness that may result in the destruction of our property by fire. Passed unanimously.

Singers From Oregon Slope
One of the most enjoyable numbers of the program was the duets sung by Mrs. W. L. Davis and Mrs. C. A. Karst of Oregon Slope accompanied by Mrs. L. R. Briethaupt. The first number was so enjoyed that the audience insisted upon an encore which was graciously given.

Club Work Urged
Mrs. Julien A. Hurley, county superintendent of schools, appeared before the meeting to urge the necessity

of more club work for the boys and girls. She said that this work in Malheur county is retarded thru lack of funds, and secured the endorsement of the gathering for the work and instructions were given the community betterment committee to ask the county court to extend financial assistance for this work.

Can Get Expert Help
Prof. Geo. R. Hyslop, of O. A. C. was the principal speaker at the afternoon program. He gave a succinct presentation of the manner in which the expert service of the college is at the disposal of the Farm Bureau and by illustration showed how effective this work has been in increasing the prosperity and solving the agricultural problems of Morrow and other counties in the state. He assured the bureau members of the support of the college and of its desire to be of real service to them.
