Mrs. Ward and daughter, Blanche, returned to their home near Beulah

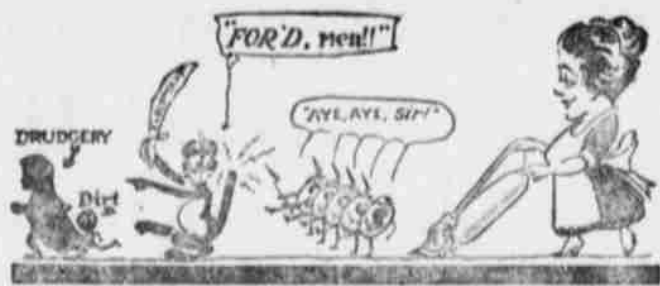
