NOTICE TO EXTERMINATE POCKET GOPHERS

Every firm, co-partnership, company or corporation residing on, owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, ditches, canals or other property, infested with pocket gophers in Malheur County, Oregon, is hereby notified to begin at once to effectively exterminate and destroy all such pocket gophers.

The following poison for mixing and instructions for use thereof is the method most expedient and effective to be used for the extermination and destruction of such pocket gophers, and is hereby recommended to wit, alkaloid strychnine used on either sweet potatoes or carrots, mixed according to the following formula and manner, to-wit:

Formula for Poisoning Pocket Gophers.

Recommended by U. S. Biological Survey and Extension Service of the Oregon Agricultural College.

Grind together in a mortar:

1-8 Ounce powdered strychnine alkaloid.

1-10 Ounce saccharine.

Cut four quarts of sweet potatoes or carrot balls, one-half inch square and one inch long, and sprinkle the above powder over them, stirring until each ball is coated thoroughly.

Introduce these into the gopher runways by probing with a sharpened stick between the mounds. When the runway is located, drop one or two balls through the hole and cover carefully so as to exclude light.

Repeat operations after four days on any place showing fresh work.

It is necessary to get this poison into the runways or it will do no good to try to poison these rodents.

The County Court of Malheur

County has secured a large amount of strychnine and saccharine, and a quantity thereof has been mixed and is now on sale to farmers and other persons interested at actual cost and may be had by applying to the Farm Bureau committeeman on Pest and Disease Control in your community, the name of whom, if unknown to you may be ascertained by writing to the undersigned at his office at Malheur, Oregon.

If any person hereinafter designated shall, within 30 days from the first publication of this notice, fail to begin in good faith to exterminate and destroy, according to the method aforesaid, or by any other effective means, said pocket gophers herein designated, the County Court of Malheur County, Oregon, will appoint a person or persons to proceed with the extermination and eradication of such pocket gophers, and the cost thereof incurred will be assessed to such land, ditches, canals or other property, and unless paid will become a lien against the same, for the extermination of said pocket gophers.

This notice is published pursuant to the statute in such sense made and provided and for two consecutive weeks or three issues, and all persons described therein are required to take notice thereof.
