Former students of the Agricultural College, the State University, and the normal school in this vicinity, have just received a booklet explaining the crisis at the three institutions. The booklet shows that the number of students at the Agricultural College has increased 148 per cent and at the University 152 per cent in seven years; but that the income from the state has increased

less than four percent. In addition, the buying power of the income has declined steadily since 1913. As a result, the three institutions are trying to train two and one-half times as many students on the equivalent of less than one-half the income, and cannot "make ends meet." These are some of the reasons for the higher educational relief bill that is to come before the people May 21.

WOMEN FAVOR PROGRESS.

Jackson county women, working with the home demonstration agent, have made 89 dress forms at a saving of \$800 over the commercial cost. They also helped in making their own fireless cookers, iceless refrigerators and home drivers. Eighty-two of them with the help of the agent are keeping household accounts, thereby reducing living expenses. They have put hot lunches into ten schools, and have themselves "gone to school" to the number of 60, where they learned millinery and dressmaking. In all, 674 families have studied foods and food values.
